## Realising the Ambition

The Scottish Government's ambition is to make Scotland the best place in the world to grow up in. There has been a focus on the importance of early years and this is recognised in the **Children and Young People (Scotland) Act Scotland 2014.** This law introduced more choice for parents and extended Early Learning and Childcare (ELC). It viewed the landscape of ELC as a continuous developmental journey for each child. It also introduced **Realising the Ambition** to guide everyone involved towards the best practice within ELC. It provides the "how" to support children achieve the outcomes outlined in the national curricular framework in Scotland — **Curriculum for Excellence** 

## **Key messages from Realising the Ambition**

- emphasises that nurture and learning go hand in hand;
- recognises the impact parents make on their children's learning;
- allows children to lead their own learning by giving them time to explore their interests;
- values play and involves children in everyday decisions;
- considers where children are in their development and support them with next steps.

Open-ended experiences and materials allow more exploration. They often lead to deeper and more creative learning as the child is empowered by the fact they cannot respond in a "wrong" way.
