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1.0 INTRODUCTION

Kettle School was built in 1875. It is a friendly village school which serves the villages of Kingskettle and Kettlebridge and the hamlets of Kettlehills, Burnturk and Balmalcolm.


The school has a high profile in the life of the local community.

The school building consists of five classrooms which all open on to the central hall which doubles as the gym and dining hall.

A controlled entry system is in place. The thirty two place nursery is housed in a separate building at the rear of the school.



The school roll currently stands at <mark>103</mark> and we have <mark>19</mark> staff. Kettle primary is part of Bell Baxter School Cluster.



2.0 SITE AUDIT

The school has one pupil entrance and is accessible from Rumdewan Terrace

There is a car park at the front of the school. This car park is for staff and visitors and must not be used by parents unless there has been prior agreement made with the Head Teacher. Pupils must not walk across the car park.

3.0 PLAN AIMS & OBJECTIVES

Aims of the School Travel Plan

- To identify and promote safer routes to school.
- To improve road safety education and encourage children to see the benefits of walking/cycling/scooting as a healthy, beneficial and preferred mode of transport to school.
- To increase the number of pupils walking and cycling to school in safety.
- To reduce traffic congestion around school.

Benefits of the STP

For the school:

- Improve safety and reduced pollution
- Reduce traffic congestion around school
- Established safer routes to walk or cycle to school

For Pupils:

- Increased travel awareness and improved road and personal safety
- Increased knowledge and awareness of the local community and environment
- Improved fitness through increased levels of walking and cycling

For Parents:

- Reduce driving stress and improve journey quality
- Less time spent driving children to school
- Reduce concerns about safety at school gates

For the community:


- Improved community awareness
- Creation of a safer environment

4.0 CURRENT TRAVEL HABITS

Questionnaires were issued to parents, pupils and staff as part of the consultation and information gathering. 58 parent/pupil surveys were completed and the findings from these have been collated and analysed; these results form the basis of this document.

4.1 **Pupil & Parent Survey results**

The results from the parent/pupil questionnaire as to how child travel to school are as follows:



The diagram shows that the majority of children attending Kettle primary school travel to school by foot. This could be because 68% of those surveyed stated that they lived within a 1 mile radius of the school gate.

Overall 71% of those who answered the survey stated that they lived within a one mile radius of the school.

The below diagram also highlights that 15% of those who live within a mile radius are driven to school each day and it is these families in particular that we would like to encourage to travel actively to school.



81% of parents would prefer their child to travel more actively with 76% willing to allow their child to be involved in Bikeability training which would then allow more children to have the opportunity to cycle to school and be equipped with the necessary skills to do this safely.

When asked if there was anything else they would like to comment on with regards to the travel choices the following suggestions were made.

"I'm concerned with pupil safety in front of the school with traffic such as buses and tractors driving past really quickly. I would suggest the area is closed during drop off hours"

"Lollypop person at foot on North Street/Rumdewan, Kingskettle"


"Encourage children always to wear helmets on their bikes and especially scooters"

"I live on the edge of the village and have a speed indicator sign outside my house, I am shocked by the speeds of parents and fear for when my children want to walk to school without me. Would love to see a police speed check here @ some point. I see parent's park badly or in school car park, perhaps a week of police confronting them"

"More needs to be done to slow traffic on rural road (school bus is great tho) - many of which don't have pavements. I enjoyed cycling but wouldn't be happy allowing my kids to cycle independently on these roads"

4.2 Staff results

The staff results showed that 67% of those staff who completed the survey travelled to school by car.



The majority of staff live 6-10 miles away from the school. 100% of them said that they would consider car sharing.

In the comments section staff identified that improvements around the school gate need to be improved and suggested the following:-

"No parking lines in front of school would help as parents continually park here and also within our staff carpark. One member of staff has recently had her car damaged due to not being able to access car park due to parked cars. We put cones out but they ignore them and park on these".

Comparative travel data

The above table highlights that Kettle are above the Fife walking average but the percentage of children been driven to school is nearly 6% above the rest of Fife schools average. However, our overall active travel modes to school are very positive.

The exercise was carried out with all children from each class across the school. During this exercise children drew on their route to school and discussed the positive and negative parts of their journey. The mapping exercise identified the following main routes to school:

7.0 KEY ISSUES AND BARRIERS

The following key issues and perceptions relating to journeys to and from Kettle Primary School were identified through the Travel Plan work:

- Inconsiderate parking around the school which causes problems including:
- Congestion at school gate
- Blocked vision for walkers and cyclists
- Blocked vision for other drivers
- Low proportion of children walking to school, especially in bad weather.
- Concerns about road safety when walking or cycling
