ay I take this opportunity to wish all pupils, parents/carers and supporters a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year. 2013 has been a very good year for Kirkcaldy High School, with many highlights reported in our regular newsletters. It has also been marked by several advances in our school/home communications networks. Keeping you informed is fundamental to the partnership working which underpins an effective school experience for all. Please allow me to remind all parents and carers of the different communication channels we use.

As well as the Newsletter, there is our monthly diary in the Fife Free Press. We also email messages home (including S1/2 homework details) - if you do not receive these, please contact the school and we'll add you to our mailing list. We now use "Parentcall" too—this is a text message alert and it will be used to notify you of any school closure. We regularly ask for updates, but if we do not have your current mobile number, please do advise us. Our website is an up to date resource with lots of "live" information and we are also the leading Fife school in the use of "Twitter" - you can follow us @KirkcaldyHigh.

You will be aware that, since the implementation of "Curriculum for Excellence", there is a change in school qualifications. The biggest change is with the

introduction of the SQA "Nationals" and it was great to see such a good turnout for our S3/4 information evening in November.

For your information the main changes are;

**National 3** replaces Standard Grade "Foundation". There is no exam and assessment is throughout the course. N3 is not graded but assessed as a "pass" or "fail".

**National 4** replaces "General" and is assessed in the same way as National 3.

**National 5** replaces "Credit". It is graded A-D, with A-C being regarded as a pass and there is an exam in May.

**Higher** remains the same standard as ever, although the content is being revised for 2015.

**Advanced Higher** is usually taken in S6 and remains the same standard with revised content.

Standard Grade now no longer exists and this session is the last of "Intermediates" for our school.

The current S4 take 6 "Nationals" and it will be the same when the current S3 enter S4. However, taking on board the comments/feedback received from parents/carers, we are looking at ways of delivering a slightly broader range in future.

I will contact all parents/carers early in the New Year to seek your opinion of any proposals and your support for any changes. It could be that we will require to adjust period lengths and the structure of the day to be able to offer greater flexibility. Initial discussion with staff and pupils has taken place and we are looking at good practice in other schools and Local Authorities.

As always, if there is any matter you would want to raise, do be in touch at any time.

### Jade's Visit to the Scottish Government HQ in Edinburgh

### Biology -STEM Update

In November, S3 and Advanced Higher Biology pupils were treated to a visit from a Dr Laura Bailey, a STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths) ambassador from the Scottish Centre for Regenerative Medicine in Edinburgh.

Dr Bailey talked to pupils about developments in stem cell medicine and the wide range of uses of stem cells.

She also gave a very interesting insight into her role as part of the NHS in developing synthetic blood derived from stem cells as an alternative to relying on blood donations.

### Christmas Music Cheer



The string quartet, supported by music instructor Mrs Anthony, was well received by shoppers as they played a selection of popular festive tunes.




### Rotary Interact Hi Five Event

# Our School Uniform Our Expectations



Thanks for your continued support with uniform. We work better together when pupils identify with the school and our shared values through a common dress code. **PLEASE BE REMINDED THAT THE FOLLOWING ITEMS SHOULD BE WORN TO SCHOOL**; white shirt (preferably with a "formal" stiff collar) or blouse, school tie knotted near the throat, plain black trousers or skirt.

A school branded fleece or plain black jumper or cardigan is also appropriate but it must be a v-neck so that the tie is visible. No jeans, track suits, white or coloured shoes/trainers, leggings or hooded clothing are allowed. Footwear must be plain black.

In S5/6, all seniors are expected to wear a black blazer with the badge on the breast pocket.

To encourage the wearing of a blazer, we permit S5/6 suitably attired to gain early entry for lunch. All other pupils join the general queue.

### Science Club Trip to "Our Dynamic Earth"

At the end of September, fourteen S1 pupils attended a science club trip to Dynamic Earth in Edinburgh. Pupils had a tour around the exhibition in the morning, looking at how the Earth was made and how it has changed over the millennia. They got up close and personal with an iceberg, took in a 3D simulation looking at the Earth's biomes and got stuck in a downpour in a rainforest.

After lunch, pupils attended a session called 'Meet the Expert' where they got the chance to meet some scientists who shared their research on the solar system with them.

Before going home, they joined in with a workshop looking at the structure of the atom and the electromagnetic spectrum. Here, they got to make their hair stand on end with a van der Graaf generator, find out about some strange things that glow in the dark and use infra red cameras to see themselves in a different light!



### Glenrothes Crowds Fall in Love with Romeo and Juliet

Mr Parkinson of the RE Department offers an account of the Shakespeare Schools Festival held at the Rothes Halls last month:

I've seen versions of Shakespearean tragedy that were unintentionally funny, versions of Shakespearean comedy where no one came even close to laughing and attempts at tragicomedy that combined both mistakes in the one play. That's not the KHS way however and once again we can be seriously proud of our Drama Dept and their travelling players who performed at the Shakespeare Schools Festival in Rothes Halls last week.

Yet again our guys were praised for their discipline and 'better than many professionals' ensemble playing, which says a lot about them, of course, and says a huge amount about the skill of their directors



Cheryll Garrie and Elaine Bruce. As usual the cast were a pretty stellar bunch and due to lack of space and time, only highlighting a few performances may seem invidious. For safety's sake just assume that if they were in it they were brilliant.

The play was Romeo and Juliet and, of course, with Scott Binnie and Rose Henderson in role, there were never going to be any problems. They delivered the lines marvellously, demonstrated the quality of the language perfectly and proved their own ability to bring these sometimes too well known characters to us as real people having real conversations about real stuff. Wonderfully done.

Christopher Duffy was a convincingly nasty Tybalt and, together with Ben Ramsay, Talia Toruntay and Mark Dunsire and others, stirred up exactly the right mix of comedy, menace and emotional involvement. The Capulet/Montague loathing was well done throughout the play, from the very striking opening scene right through to it's dissipation at the tragic end, but the hostile interactions, 'thumb biting' comic tension and then the death of Ben's Mercutio were particularly outstanding, the latter being praised in particular by the actor/director giving notes after the performance.

One final comment before you see the play for yourselves, as you must, when it's performed in school. Towards the closing scene as Rachel Mcintosh, Romeo's dealer, was about to sell him the poison, the lights failed unexpectedly. Many of us would have lost our nerve but Rachel carried on and was praised afterwards as 'a very brave apothecary'. If you can pronounce it, call her that. Well done everyone!

Kirkcaldy High School's own "in-house" sexual health drop in clinic has been granted a "Bronze" Excellence Award by COSLA—The Convention of Scottish Local Authorities. School Nurse Val Reid and her team, alongside our Guidance staff, support our young people every Friday lunchtime. The service provides advice, practical support with contraception and pregnancy testing, and "signposting" to Whytemans Brae Hospital as required.

We will learn soon whether the service, which is unique in Fife schools, will make it through to the Awards finals held in Glasgow in the spring.

In January, KHS will host Michael Matheson, the Scottish Government's Minister for Public Health, who is on a fact finding mission to highlight good practice in tackling teenage pregnancy around Scotland.
