The Rector writes ...

t's traditionally at this time of year that we take stock and think ahead looking back at the year past and forward to the one ahead. For Kirkcaldy High School, it has been a year of significant achievements, on many levels. In 2014, we were presented with a COSLA Excellence Award for our pioneering work in respect of teenage pregnancy prevention. We were also finalists in the "Daily Record" Scottish Education Awards, in the Health and Wellbeing category and, in August, we were selected as Kingdom FM's "Best School" in Fife. We are rightly proud of these accolades. And, whilst all this was going on, our young people continued to make very good progress in their SQA exams and in their personal achievements. I am sure that you will know this to be the case; you'll have seen our termly newsletters and our Standards and Quality Report, which highlight our strong progress. I could not be more proud of our young people.

I mentioned teenage pregnancy prevention, and I am pleased to report quite dramatic success in reducing the rate of under 16 pregnancy locally. You will be aware that we have introduced a hard hitting sex and relationships education programme, aspects of which are delivered by "peer educators" - young people specially trained to lead discussion groups on difficult subjects. We have also established a weekly "drop-in" clinic with condom distribution, pregnancy testing and referral for longer term contraception or infection screening.

In 2010, before we began our initiative, the rate of

under 16 pregnancy across the KHS catchment was, at 14.2 per thousand, one of the highest in Fife. The latest data shows a big reduction, to 5.2 per thousand—the 4th lowest of any Fife secondary school catchment. I must commend our excellent Guidance Team, led by Mrs Houston and Mrs Ritchie and our terrific School Nurse team, led by Val Reid. This is a very significant achievement.

All parents/carers are invited to attend a special meeting of the KHS Parent Council on Tues 3 Feb. We seek your opinion on recent Fife Council proposals on adjustments to the school day — including the idea to have a shorter Friday for pupils.

May I extend a warm welcome to new teacher, Miss Samfat, in Business Education. Miss Samfat joined us in November after Miss Kelly took up a position in Paisley.

You will know that we make strenuous efforts to keep you informed about the life of KHS. As well as our Newsletter, there is our monthly diary in the Fife Free Press. We also email messages home (including S1/2 homework details) - if you do not receive these, please contact the school and we'll add you to our mailing list. We use "Parentcall" too-this is a text message or email alert and it will be used to notify you of any school closure or other urgent matter. We regularly ask for updates, but if we do not have your current mobile number, please do advise us. Our website is an up to date resource with lots of "live" information and you perhaps know that we are also the leading Fife school in the use of "Twitter" - you can follow us @KirkcaldyHigh. Many of you already do, and we have almost 900 followers.

Thinking ahead ... there remains much to do. We want to be the very best around. Thanks for backing the mission.

Congratulations to our Arkwright Engineering Scholarship Winners 2014

We recently celebrated great success in a national competitive scholarship scheme. The Arkwright Scholarships Trust administers one of the most prestigious scholarship schemes in the UK. Awarded through a rigorous selection process to the highest calibre young people, the Scholarship supports students through their Highers and encourages them to pursue engineering or related areas of design at university or through a high-quality apprenticeship, and to take up careers in the field. They are supported by mentors from leading industrial companies in the engineering field.

The Engineering Scholarships are sponsored by industry, universities, charitable trusts, trade associations, professional engineering institutions, the Armed Services and personal donors. Each scholar recives a $\pounds 600$ support grant and the scholar's school is awarded $\pounds 400$ to support the development

of STEM (Science, Technology, Maths and Engineering) across the school.

This year, Kirkcaldy High School was in the unique position of having 4 successful applicants out of only 150 scholarships on offer across the UK. This is the highest number for any single school in Scotland.

Rector, Mr Allan, said that he was immensely proud of the successful young people and thanked the school's Design and Engineering Dept for its excellent work in supporting technology in Kirkcaldy High School. "We have the best team around, and they are growing the engineers of the future", he said. The Rector added that the uptake and success rate of Engineering Science subjects in the school was the highest in Fife and also thanked FMC Technologies, Dunfermline, for its sponsorship of the application costs associated with the scheme.

There were many Spanish native speakers in attendance at the festival and our pupils had a chance to mingle in the café beforehand.

Fife "Energy Hub" Launch at KHS

KHS is proud to be front runners in a very exciting new now an official Fife "Energy Hub".

We have identified a group of 16 young people who will be mentored by experienced off shore engineers and employers with a view to boosting their employability prospects in a range of engineering fields—especially, but not ASDA exclusively within the oil and gas sector.

All of the group members are currently studying Engineering Science in school and they will also have the opportunity to develop high level "hands-on" skills through evening class sessions at Fife College and site visits/work experience-including a trip to Aberdeen, Europe's oil capital.

The programme has been developed by an Aberdeen based agency called "Your Future In Energy" sponse to the serious skills gap in engineering in the UK.

The school is strongly committed to support young people's employability skills and has a great tradition in engineering—we are also a pilot school for the new Foundation Modern Apprenticeship programme in Engineering.

Mr Morrice, Head of CDT and Mr Hamilton, Senior Teacher (Engineering Science) were both involved in the induction and commented on the very high levels of engagement of our "Hub" group. Tom Clark, of "Your Future In Energy" was also impressed by the KHS young engineers and is looking forward to delivering the full programme over the coming months.

Learning Council Gives Pupils a Voice

The Kirkcaldy High School Learning Council is a group of 22 S6 pupils who meet every Thursday lunchtime to discuss a variety of whole-school issues, many of which focus on Learning and Teaching. We were delighted, at the start of this session to be nominated by our Learning Council as the "Best School in Fife" and to win this Kingdom FM award.

This year so far we have spoken about the proposed changes to the school week with the group feeding back on how this would be viewed from a pupil perspective in terms of the pros, such as time for sporting activities, and cons, for example, concerns about exam attainment. We had a general issues meeting where pupils fed back on what was going well and what could be improved in school following a discussion where Mrs Aitken shared the Whole School Improvement Plan. Heather Tait, Kirstin Gourlay and Kerry Steedman met with Mrs Guyan to discuss school lunches and shared ideas on theme days such as Chinese, Mexican, American, Indian and Thai. Following this year's exam results, we discussed some trends in the data and ideas around how these could be improved, such as the differing approaches to learning taken by boys versus girls. There was also a very good discussion around the 4Cs poster, rules and rewards.



We are looking forward to the pre-Christmas S6 event which will take place on Wednesday10 Dec. This is organised by James Farmer (Depute Head Boy) through the Learning Council, and was sanctioned by Mr Allan, following a letter written by Taylor Springthorpe on behalf of the group and including a detailed plan for the evening, which will involve pizza, a movie and "guitar hero" as well as other games.

Next term we will invite Councillor Crooks to discuss our ideas and input to the Kirkcaldy Community plan. Scott Binnie has suggested that we pilot a community project involving S6 and P6/7 pupils and parents from our cluster primaries.

Shakespeare Schools' Festival 2014 - KHS Presents "As You Like It" at the Rothes Halls, Glenrothes



Mr Parkinson of the RE Department offers a review of our recent performance at the Shake-speare Schools Festival: "Our Shakespearean actors, directed by Elaine Bruce, have yet again done us proud. This year, they tackled an abbreviated version of 'As you like it', a very complicated play at full length which must have been even harder to get to grips with when shortened. There were rival Dukes, exiles, rebellious daughters, rival brothers, four pairs of would-be lovers, cross-dressing, mistaken identity, drunkenness, boxing and wandering in the forest.

With this happening, it must have been a real challenge to get into the characters and make sense of the script but our people were praised for precisely that. They let the text speak, brought out the comedy in the lines and even with such short snapshots of the characters they inhabited their roles convincingly. It's possibly invidious to single out particular people especially when the overall standard was so high but some of the highlights were: Ben Ramsay and Mark Dunsire as the feuding brothers Oliver and Orlando. They wrestled with their characters and each other to great effect. Their first scene was remarked upon by the person sitting next to me, a veteran of performances and parent of another school's di-

rector. 'That was brilliant. They're really good' she said, as Ben and Mark exited the stage.

Megan Greer's Rosalind was brilliant. She had probably the biggest part and was required at several points to pretend to be another character pretending to be herself. Given the pace this play was going at, this was dizzying stuff and Megan should be very proud of herself. Rosalind's companion Celia/Aliena, played by Charlotte MacMillan was very well done. The rival Dukes managed to handle comedy, exile, menace, due repentance and the baffling number of comings and goings with aplomb. Well done to Chris Duffy and Rachel Dunlay. Scott Binnie's fool, Touchstone, succeeded in wooing the non-poetical Audrey, Rose Henderson. Clearly no fool at all! It's a very funny little dialogue and they nailed it.

I go to the Shakespeare Schools' Festival every year - it's a great night, with half hour versions of several plays from different schools. Ours is always well worth seeing and is usually repeated at KHS sometime after the main event. If you miss these performances you really are missing out. I haven't mentioned the rest of the cast by name but be assured on the world of this stage they were no mere players".

Megan and Charlotte recently attended a presentation from the Mary Leishman Foundation which took place at East End Park, Dunfermline. The Foundation generously donated £500 towards the school's next drama production—which is likely to be a musical next year. Reach for the Stars!

The KHS Astronomy Club attended the St. Andrews University Observatory open night on Saturday 29th November. The Observatory has a number of telescopes, with the most famous being the James Gregory Telescope (JGT), which is the largest of its type in Scotland.

We saw three on the night, one with a ten inch mirror, another at 16 inches, whilst the JGT has a massive 38 inch mirror. There were various talks and demonstrations, including one on exoplanets - planets that have been discovered orbiting distant stars far away from our Solar System.

The number of planets being discovered is rising all the time and currently stands at over 1,500. Unfortunately, the weather was not on our side and the clouds only offered fleeting glimpses of the Moon. Hopefully, the next time we go it will be a clear night and all those telescopes can be put to good use!

Geography, History and Modern Studies pupils enjoyed three days in London last month where they got a chance to learn more about some of the topics they had been studying in class. Peer Educators Lead "Boozebusters" and "Sexperts"

The school has rightly been recognised as being highly effective in involving young people in their learning in the widest sense. One way in which we do this is through peer education, which involves more mature and confident young people being selected and trained to lead lessons and facilitate discussion. This is a feature in several areas of the curriculum.



One such area is in Personal and Social Education, where NHS and school staff have trained over 20 S5 pupils to deliver sessions on alcohol and relationships to S2 pupils. The most recent groupwork based sessions took place in the assembly hall with support staff on hand if required. Our peer educators led the groups and many young people noted that it was easier to talk freely in situations like this.

Peer educators were recently asked to give talks to NHS Grampian staff in Aberdeen and teachers in Dundee about this approach. Many thanks to Erin Sandilands, Brogan Wilkie, Mariama Penman and Morgan Stupart, who were outstanding ambassadors for the school. Another such event takes place in Dunblane in the new year.

Remembered for What They Have Done

On Tuesday 11 November, we held a two minute silence and a very special ceremony at our War Memorial as a mark of respect for those who have fallen in war. With well over 108 names from the First World War, our memorial is thought to be one of the largest school memorials in Scotland. We were honoured to be joined by Chief Petty Officer Tam King of the Royal Navy and John Beck, who has written a remarkable book about the KHS Great War dead. Af-





ter a few words from the Rector and a reading by Mark Dunsire, Head Boy, wreaths were laid by CPO King and our pupils. Head Girl Abigail James played the Last Post on cornet and John Beck told the large audience about his research and new book "The Memorial in the School".

Over the period, we held special assemblies which included moving monologues from Scott Binnie, Adam Campbell and Ben Ramsay, as well as a musical input from Dr Murray of the Chemistry Department, who sang "Willie McBride" by Eric Bogle and played "Flo'ers o' the Forest" on fiddle. On Sunday 9 November, Mark and Abigail laid a wreath at the Kirkcaldy War Memorial and KHS played a major part in the reception afterwards at the Adam Smith Theatre. The Rector spoke about the impact of the Great War on Kirkcaldy High School and Scott, Adam and Ben delivered monologues as ghost voices of ex KHS pupils killed in 1914-1918. Dr Murray sang and played. The school was highly commended by many of those present for a moving and fitting tribute to the casualties of war.
