"STEM" Focus on Employment Skills

Oil and Gas Explored



On Monday 7 December, а group of S4-6 pupils were treated to an illustrated talk about apprenticeship opportunities in the oil

and gas sector. Kiti Kelemen of OPITO, a global recruitment and training agency, visited the school to explain the various trades, working conditions and the recruitment process for Modern Apprentices offshore.

Pupils learned of the many varied career paths available and what to expect from the aptitude tests and interviews which entrants undergo. Several young people have said that they intend to make an application on leaving school.



A major highlight from earlier this term was our S2 "Speedy STEM" challenge, held in the Hall with partners; Fife College, the Construction Industry Training Board and the Hydrogen Office at Methil. Pupils worked in teams to design and build robots, parachutes, wind turbines and compressed air jet engines - specifically with a problem to solve.

It was an excellent experience which boosted creativity and cooperation. In line with our "Young Workforce" strategy, this will also have benefitted our young people's employability and knowledge of potential careers in science, technology and engineering.

As platinum partners Kirkcaldy High School will benefit from all of the new initiatives provided by the RAF recruitment team including station visits, career presentations and table top exercises organised by the RAF in schools. One of the most popular challenges is team building exercise based on a disaster relief situation.

Rector Derek Allan said that the school was proud to be so closely associated with the RAF and praised its education programme. Last week all S1 and S2 were treated to an excellent engineering skills workshop delivered jointly by the RAF and BAE Systems.



Squadron Leader Morris praised the school for its work preparing applicants so well for the RAF's tough selection process. He explained that the service has a recruitment drive in all areas, ranging from pilots to technicians and chefs.

Miss Higham Scoops Top UK "STEM" Award

A Kirkcaldy High School Principal Teacher has won the final of the Annual STEMNET Awards 2015 in the Most Dedicated Teacher in the UK category, presented at the House of Lords in London. Helen Higham, a Biology teacher and Principal Teacher of "STEM", received the STEMNET STEM Teacher award for her efforts to inspire youngsters to participate in STEM subjects (science, technology, engineering and maths).

The awards were presented in six categories by BBC presenter Steph McGovern and STEMNET'S CEO Kirsten Bodley to winners from across the UK, and the Science and Technology Facilities Council presented the winners with an exclusive visit to CERN. Winners flew to Geneva in December, where they had the opportunity to see cutting edge science in action, as well as meet with top physicists and engineers from across the world renowned facility.

Miss Higham is Kirkcaldy High School's STEM co-ordinator and runs the school's STEM Club. She leads the school's annual employability event with more 25 STEM Ambassadors and makes a priority of helping to break down stereotypes and promote positive role models for girls in STEM.



"This award is really the accumulation of a lot of work by a lot of people," said Miss Higham at the ceremony. "Fife has massive STEM based career progression. We are lucky that there are so many opportunities for our pupils to develop towards positive destinations in STEM subjects so it's really up to us to try and make sure the pupils are leaving school with the skills they need to succeed in these jobs." Commenting, Roger Mullin MP said: "Helen's efforts to encourage interest and participation in STEM subjects amongst young people in my constituency have been extraordinary".

KHS Eco School Latest Green News

Throughout this term we have been considering ways to improve our school's Eco-friendliness, and we have placed our ideas into 3 categories; Litter, School Grounds and Reducing Waste. From this, we have created an action plan that we will carry out over the next few years with the hope of achieving a Green Flag for our school. To help us figure out our aims, we had a visitor from Kinghorn Ecology Centre to talk to us about what we could do to make ourselves Eco-friendly. We also thought of activities and ways to encourage all years to join in.

This term we have also been selling Fairtrade products at evening events to raise funds for the changes we wish to make, and for other events around the school, namely the Kirkcaldy Food Bank. We are also using these Fairtrade products to make Christmas hampers that will be made to order to be picked up in December.

UNICEF "Rights Respecting School" Latest



Our pupils have been working hard to move forward our involvement and progress in extending our commitment to the UNICEF Rights Respecting Schools Award. Mr Marshall has established a Steering Group made up of pupils from different year groups and backgrounds. The S6 Learning Council teamed up with the Steering Group during Tutor Class visits the first week back after the October break to explain to their peers the Articles which make up the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child. These were then discussed by all 48 Tutor Groups and the most 'chosen' Articles have been short listed by each of the House Forums.

Our school will base our own charter around these short listed Articles – a truly consultative and democratic approach to a school charter which will promote: inclusion, democracy, fairness and empathy

through charitable work locally, nationally and internationally.

Fife College Roadshow

The College staff explained the vast range of opportunities for progression after school and gave information about how entry at National Certificate level can lead to HNC or HND in the College and degree entry at a range of partner universities.

KHS works closely with the College at present with young people attending 2 afternoons a week to study construction skills,

hair and beauty or childcare. We intend to expand this next session with new courses in bakery and psychology becoming available.



Emily is our Arkwright Engineering Scholar 2015

We recently celebrated the success of Emily Cunningham (S5) in a national competitive scholarship scheme. The Arkwright Scholarships Trust administers one of the most prestigious scholarship schemes in the UK. Awarded through a rigorous selection process to the highest calibre young people, the Scholarship supports students through their Highers and encourages them to pursue engineering or related areas of design at university or through a high-quality apprenticeship, and to take up careers in the field.

They are supported by mentors from leading industrial companies in the engineering field. The Engineering Scholarships are sponsored by industry, universities, charitable trusts, trade associations, professional engineering institutions, the Armed Services and personal donors. Each scholar receives a £600 support grant and the scholar's school is awarded £400 to support the development of STEM (Science, Technology, Maths and Engineering) across the school.

In recent years, Kirkcaldy High School has often been the leading state school in Scotland in terms of awards. Mr Allan (Rector) said that he was immensely proud of Emily and thanked the school's Design and Engineering Dept for its excellent work in supporting technology in Kirkcaldy High School. "We have the best team around ... and they are growing the engineers of the future", he said. The Rector added that the uptake and success rate of Engineering Science subjects in the school was the highest in Fife and also thanked FMC Technologies, Dunfermline, for its ongoing sponsorship of the application costs associated with the scheme.

"Nil by Mouth" - Tackling Sectarianism

Meningitis Now Appeal

We recently hosted Steve Dayman, Executive Founder of Meningitis Now - a remarkable man who has raised over $\pounds 20$ million for meningitis research since the death of his infant son, Spencer, over 30 years ago.

Steve spoke to all S5/6 and we had chance to remember our own Gregor Smith, who died of the disease in 2013.

KHS Has raised almost \pm 7000 for Meningitis Now over the past 2 years and will be fund raising again this year. A sponsored swim is planned for the spring.



Bringing History Alive

Higher History pupils got a rare treat earlier in the term when Fraser Brown, well known World War 1 researcher and historian, and latterly associated with the Black Watch Museum in Perth, visited the school to deliver an Illustrated talk.

Fraser spent the afternoon in KHS and spoke of the impact of the war on the home front in Fife and Angus before explaining the battle plan and tactics used at the battle of Loos, which took place in 1915.

Earlier this year, Fraser had made excellent use of the school's comprehensive archives when researching an academic paper on the impact of the Great War on young people and children across eastern Scotland. The school has records going back to the nineteenth century.
