## The Rector Writes ....

**7** ith another session over, it is satisfying to reflect that for KHS, it has been a very happy and successful one in so many ways. I am probably most proud of our gaining the UNICEF "Rights Respecting School" Silver Award a couple of months back. This was recognition of many strands of our work but I think that, above all, it says that we are a listening school. Our young people are the school, and are central to all we do ... and this fits very well Week Beginning 16 April with our core value of "Respect".

Further very positive news came a couple of weeks ago with the publication of the "Parentwise" and "Pupilwise" surveys. These

were conducted online by Fife Council. The full report is on our website, with a tab on our homepage.

Remarkably, in all of the 57 questions asked, the KHS "satisfaction" rate was above the Fife average, often significantly so. Overall, the Pupilwise level was more positive 7%

with "Parentwise" 15% above.

Some of the important trends are that 11% more of our young people say that they feel safe and cared for in school, 12% more enjoy their learning and 10% more report that they are happy in school. The "Parentwise" report indicates that 95% of our parents/carers are "happy with the school". The Fife figure is 79%.

I must thank you for this very powerful vote of confidence, it means a lot for us here to have our collective efforts recognised by you ... and to have your backing. In some ways this is reflected in the sharp rise in our school roll for the session ahead, much of this due to "placing requests". However, as I shared at the Prizegiving last month, we will strive to do better still. Usque Conabor, as it says on the badge!

Finally, you are likely aware that Mrs Aitken will be Acting Headteacher of Lochgelly High School, from August. We have moved quickly to "backfill", and I'm delighted that Mrs Sharon Hamilton, currently Head of Maths, will be an Acting Depute Rector on return. She will be Yearhead for S3, with Mr Young taking on that role for S1/2. Miss Diamond stays with S4 and Mrs Davidson oversees S5/6.
