In the School

As you can imagine it's been a very busy time in the school. With Christmas just around the corner classes have been working on their performances, getting ready for the Christmas Fayre and continuing with their learning.

P.5/6 and P.6 have had 'Eats Rosyth' in, helping out in the class. They are a community led charity who grow and share food, help the environment and improve food education. They have brought in a lot of vegetables and have been helping with their enterprise. If you look at the planters around the school you will see some of the work they have been doing.

A storyteller visited P4 to help pupils learn about the roles that animals play in traditional tales worldwide. After hearing a Native American story about a very lazy coyote who pushed his only friend to the brink of despair, the pupils then collaboratively created and told a story about local wildlife, including the importance of allowing hibernating animals to remain undisturbed over the course of the winter. P4's story involved a sleepy hedgehog being bothered by vans, foxes and noisy humans before a mystical chicken from outer space saved the day and ensured that the hedgehog got the rest she needed! They then retold the story in the form of totem poles, used by some Native American peoples to permanently record traditional stories. They had a great time, and loved the visit.

During November we had a 'Children in Need' day where we did our 'Walk and Talk' mile. Pupils paired up in classes, usually an older class with a younger class, and walked around the school together. In total we raised £208 for Children in Need. My thanks to everyone who donated to Children in Need.

We also raised £543 for Save the Children with our Christmas jumper day. Thanks to everyone

Parent Portal

Thanks to all parents who signed up to the Parent Portal. We currently have 99% of parents on the system. We were informed that this is the highest percentage of any school in Scotland. Well done to the parents at Masterton for achieving such a high level. Well done to Mrs Stevenson and Mrs Brown for working so hard to achieve this. In addition we have 100% of parents signed up to Ipay (school lunch/trip etc payment system) which is a phenomenal achievement on all parts.

Achievements

I'm always interested in pupils' achievements outside of school and I was recently made aware of Ella Gracie's achievements. Ella (P.7a) has had what can only be described as a fantastic year in her Acrobatic Gymnastics. In January she travelled to Stoke on Trent to compete at the biggest Acrobatic Gymnastics event of the year. There she and her partner won a Silver Medal coming second to the 2021 British Champions. Unfortunately, Ella broke three bones in her foot in June so couldn't try out for the UK team. However, when her foot recovered she tried out for the Scottish team and was selected to go to Budapest. They won the final, winning a Gold Medal for Scotland. There have been other successes since then with further wins at the Scottish Championships and the biggest win of the year in the British Championships. I should also probably mention that her partner is Scarlett Haldane another ex-Masterton pupil.

When I found all this out I was amazed that this had all happened without me knowing anything about it. Thinking about it I do believe that we have lost something since Covid. I used to have a good idea about what our pupils were achieving. I'll need to have a good think about how we record and recognise things like this as they are so important.

All staff - Who ran a stall or worked with the pupils to create Christmas activities or items for a stall.


The pupils - For helping at stalls, helping set up the hall and creating in their class.
