

They also assisted us in a practice challenge, offering hints and tips on how to read the events on the Stock Market.

On the day of the live Challenge, **Margaret Cole** and **Brandon Connelly** were our winners with a respectable profit of £10,366. Unfortunately this year we were "pipped at the post" but it was a very enjoyable experience for all who took part.



UK Bebras Challenge 2015



During the week beginning 9 November all our S2 BECS pupils along with S3 – S6 Computing Science pupils took part in the UK Bebras Computational Thinking Challenge.

The *UK Bebras Computational Thinking Challenge* is a competition aimed at raising awareness of Computer Science in a fun and rewarding way. The competition involves solving problems using computational thinking skills.

Computational thinking involves using a set of problem-solving skills and techniques that software engineers use to write programs and apps. Examples of these techniques would include the ability to break down complex tasks into simpler components, algorithm design, pattern recognition, pattern generalisation and abstraction.

This year over 50,000 students in the UK and Europe took part in the competition.

All pupils have now been issued with their certificates for taking part in the Challenge.

A special congratulation goes to our "Best in School" pupils who achieved the highest marks in school at each level.

On the afternoon of Wednesday 9 December Mrs Connelly's Higher Computing Science class attended the annual Christmas Lecture given by the Computer and Information Sciences department at Strathclyde University.

This year's lecture was delivered by Dr Ross

Duncan on the subject of

"What is a Quantum Computer?"

Dr Duncan looked at the idea that for the past 45 years the components used to build computers have been getting smaller and smaller, so what happens when we take this to its ultimate limit and use individual sub-atomic particles as components? You get a *Quantum Computer*!

At such small scales our usual ideas about how computers work no longer apply: quantum computers are governed by the strange laws of quantum physics.

By taking advantage of these bizarre properties quantum computers can do many things, which are impossible for a normal computer, and force us to re-evaluate our ideas about reality itself.

It was a very enjoyable and informative afternoon for all.













On Sunday 6 December, 13 S5/6 BECS pupils changed their school uniform for Santa suits, for Glasgow City Councils Annual 5K Santa Dash. This is the first year that Lourdes Secondary has taken part in the event and it was safe to say that all pupils and staff from the Faculty had a "jolly" great time.

Citizenship Project

This term the young people in the ALN Provision have been busy working on a Citizenship project. They have been learning about responsibility and caring for others including the animals in our communities. We have made posters, read and watched animal issues in the news, made help guides for new owners and have learned about animal charities and the animals who help people in their daily lives.

We have had two visiting speakers this term to the provision and were joined by Miss McSween's S4 XL Group.

Our first visit was from Hearing Dogs for the Deaf. Neil Smith came to school to speak with us about how his working dog, Ginger has changed his life for the better. Ginger and other hearing dogs alert owners to sounds in the home and outside where there is a need- for example Neil's alarm clock! The young people were amazed at the skills demonstrated by Ginger and happy to see how well Ginger and Neil work together. When the special coat of a working dog is on, it is work time, but Ginger enjoys chasing squirrels in her spare time when the coat comes off.

The young people also visited the Dog's Trust in Glasgow to learn about different animal care jobs and for a tour of the centre. Alison, an Education Officer from Dog's Trust visited the ALN Provision with her dog Alfie to do workshops with young people about caring for animals. The pupils in S1 and S2 went on a dog walk with Alfie in the local community and really enjoyed it!




Modern Languages Department

The workshop allowed the pupils to ask George Bowie questions about achieving careers in radio and sound production and he also shared some of his experiences with them, which was excellent to hear!

Lourdes recently hosted the first ever 'Talent for Life' inter-schools talent competition. The event was the brainchild of young members of the Lourdes Life Group.

Senior pupils who had been studying Catholic Social Teaching as part of their S6 Re course came on board with the suggestion that the event should be a practical expression of this teaching and decided to fundraise for refugees through SCIAF. Head boy – Ebuka Nnemani expressed this with great eloquence when he referred to the Parable of the Talents in his welcome speech.

The talent competition was preceded by mass which was concelebrated on the feast of the Vietnamese martyrs by Archbishop Philip Tartaglia, Lourdes chaplain Fr. Gerry Walsh, Msgr Gilmartin and Fr. John Carrol, the Holyrood chaplain who had previously served as Lourdes Secondary's chaplain for eight years. Archbishop Tartaglia spoke movingly in his sermon of the fortitude and determination required of young people who choose to stand up and show their compassion for the unborn and for the world's most vulnerable.

There was a stunning array of talent on show- from string quartets to boy bands and everything in between! Our own B Sharps put in an amazing performance which had the audience on their feet!

First prize went to singer/songwriters, Sabrina Mandulu and Erin McEvoy of Lourdes Secondary who performed a beautifully haunting song they had written especially for the occasion, entitled 'Who Can Bear to Feel Themselves Forgotten?'



Second place went to Clodagh and Shannon O'Donnell sisters from St Ninians who gave a beautiful rendition of two Irish traditional tunes on the harp and fiddle.

Well done Rowan!






Enterprise News

Lourdes Social Entrepreneurs Give Back!

Our S4 Enterprise and Employability Pupils have created a Social Enterprise as part of their course work this year. A Social Enterprise is a business that is not all about profit but is there to support another cause. Our talented group of entrepreneurs have established a gap in the market for a stationery selling business in school. They have conducted market research about what their customers wants and needs and how best they could meet these. They have created their company, branding, ran advertising campaigns and sourced their suppliers of stock.



They have also decided what the social aim of their business is. They will be suing all profits raised to support the homeless by working with Shelter Scotland. They will donate any money made but more than that, they want to work with Shelter Scotland to produce materials, information or workshops to help young people in schools understand what it means to be homeless and to try to remove any stigma attached.

On the 19th November the group successfully launched their business, *The Social Write*, in school. They made a tidy sum which will now be reinvested for their next set of products and also some will go to Shelter Scotland.

In February, the pupils will also be taking part in a Dragons Den event with Glasgow City Council, The Social Enterprise Academy and Glasgow Social Enterprise Network where they hope to secure £100 to develop their business further. Fingers crossed!
