


Anti-Bullying Film Festival May 2021





To mark International Day Against Homophobia, Transphobia and Biphobia our school held a film festival on 15 May 2021 to showcase anti-bullying films made by our creative and compassionate P6-P7s. Powerful messages were shared about LGBTQ+ inclusion, anti-bullying and being an ally.



The Equalities Group asked our janitor to compere the Film Festival. Mr Gray is a fun-loving staff member and helped maintain a good balance between helping make the Film Festival a powerful, thought provoking experience, whilst at the same time enjoyable and inspiring for children and staff.

P5-7 youngsters attended the Film Festival. As the photos demonstrate, the audience was engrossed by the anti-bullying films. Many children reported feeling very moved and emboldened to take positive action after watching the powerful films.












All the lovely touches organised by the Equalities Group (tickets, popcorn, red carpet, decorated hall etc.,) helped make the campaign extra special and memorable.







Each finalist received a certificate and the winners of the 4 final categories were awarded a 'Bafta' trophy with an inscription relating to their winning category.

The overall Best Film trophy is an impressive glass award which will be displayed in school with the winner's name.



And the winner of the Best Film category is ...

Equalities Group representative Darwin made an announcement about the group's reasons for selecting the winner of the Best Film category. Darwin explained that the decision was hard because of the high standard of entries. The group shortlisted a number of films that best got across the important message of our rights to expression, individuality and acceptance. The group also wanted to give the award to a film that made it clear that bullying is never ok and reinforced the message that we should all be kind and understanding towards each other. We had a number of excellent entries that dealt with LGBTQ+ issues in their movies, this is something the group were very keen to see in the winning film. The group chose a film that made these points clearly, while using soundtrack effectively, as well as intricate and precise animation. The winner of Broomhill Best Film was

Jenna MacKenzie, with her superb film 'Stand Out Fit In'.

Whole School Event

P5-7 pupils attended the film festival. We originally intended that our P4 classes to also attend the event. However, Covid-19 social distancing restrictions meant we had to maintain 2 metre distance between class bubbles. As a result only P5-7 classes could fit in the hall. Our P3-4 children watched Jenna's film in class. We ensured that the P3-P4 stages had already been taught planned lessons from our P3-4 RSHP programme about LGB people. Hence, they would have a basic understanding about the subject matter.

The P1-4 teachers also all read books about different families (in P1-2) and featuring characters with LGBT identities (P3-4). The children all made rainbow headbands and many dressed in colours of the rainbow. A wonderfully moving and impactful day was had by all.
