
What are the best things about living in Glasgow?

Celebrating Glasgow's 850th birthday at Sandy Road Day Nursery

Staff shared that Glasgow was having an 850th birthday and discussed how they would like to celebrate this with the children. Using mind maps to record the children's views, the children suggested having a **Scottish birthday party**, here are some of their comments:

I get presents on my birthday; at nursery we get a book. I want to wear a pretty dress; a Scotland dress is made of tartan. J

We need decorations, I like balloons, pink ballons and I need to wear my special outfit. M I like to play with my friends at nursery for the party. We can do dancing, and I will wear my dress and jewellery. H

I live in Glasgow, wow 850 is a big number. M

'I go to soft play for parties, I get presents on my birthday' B "We can have a cake, it needs so many candles. I-R

Play games, you go in a circle and hold hands. H

Music, dancing and friends. Δ



These comments will not only be typical of Sandy Road nursery, they will be representative of lots of children from our early year's establishments across our wonderful City. Using the children's knowledge as a starting point we would like to invite all early year's establishments across the city to take part in the biggest Ceilidh Glasgow has ever seen on **Friday 30th of May at 11 am and 2pm.**



At Sandy Road, staff and children went on to discuss what kind of birthday present/gift we could give to Glasgow and came up with *The Big Glasgow Clean Up* here are some of our children's comments:

'You can't make a mess it's not nice to drop things on the floor, we put it in the bin, The Grey and Blue bins for recycling'

'Outside the nursery is my house, I am in Glasgow I help to tidy up the rubbish it will look nicer' R

'I live in Scotland, and I want it to be beautiful' F

'We need a litter picker, so our hands don't get dirty. We need to pick up our trash, so we don't slip on a banana peel' F



'Putting rubbish on the floor makes it dirty', 'we can clean it, I have long arms I can pick up all the things', 'the trees have fallen we can pick them up too, I am stronger', F





These comments are representative of Glasgow's amazing children, why not join us in supporting your local community by organising your own regular litter picks? Imagine the difference we could all make.

Sandy Road Day Nursery purchased three Scottie dogs (one for each playroom) to use as a home link. The staff team were invited to take part in a fun competition to name the dogs, with each of the winners receiving a small, fun, Glasgow themed prize.

Alongside each dog a family learning book was created, this is the introduction:



There are codes and email addresses for families to share their pictures of Nevis on his adventures with the nursery. The book includes the Glasgow Coat of Arms and a wee Glasgow Rhyme, and each family get to keep the book for future use.

 - Here is the bell that never rang,







The Coat of Arms was officially adopted in 1866. A modernised version is now in use.

The legend of St. Mungo:

Here is the bird that never flew, Here is the tree that never grew, Here is the bell that never rang, Here is the fish that never swam.



The children looked online and found the coat of arms displayed near our nursery is the one outside Partick Library, we then used Google Maps on an iPad and walked to the library, some of the children's

comments were:



'I've seen it before at Glasgow that's where I live, I saw it on the roof at the top of the bridge' M

'we can use the map to find it' 'let's go to the fountain' 'it's in the park 'M

'we are looking for a fish and a tree and a bird and a bell, I'm going to look with my mummy too' F 'I see fish in the river' 'I see the river when I go for a walk and see the big boat' O

'I've seen this before in the museum' it looks like the shark is trying to eat the tree' H

'My sister goes to that museum' 'I live in Glasgow' Z

'There is a fish on the bus stop' S


'I found the coat of arms on your badge' M
