


#### Simon vs Homo Sapien Agenda by Becky Albertalli




#### Last Bus to Everland by Sophie Cameron


## Out of the Blue by Sophie Cameron


# Postcards to No Man's Land by Aiden Chambers


#### Love in Revolution by BR Collins


#### The Miseducation of Cameron Post by Emily M Danforth

#### Meat Market by Juno Dawson



#### PET by Akwaeke Emezi




# If You Could be Mine by Sara Farizan

#### George by Alex Gino




# Girl Mans Up by M-E Girard


#### The Space Between by Meg Grehan

# The Love and Lies of Rukshana Ali by Sobina Khan




# Boy Meets Boy by David Levithan

How do you stay together?



# Every Day by David Levithan





# Two Boys Kissing by David Levithan


The two boys kissing are Craig and Harry. They're hoping to set the world record for the longest kiss. They're not a couple, but they used to be.


# You Know Me Well by David Levithan and Nina LaCour


# The Names They Gave Us by Emery Lord


#### Release by Patrick Ness




# I Was Born for This by Alice Oseman

But dreams don't always turn out the way you think and when Jimmy and Angel are unexpectedly thrust together, they find out how strange and surprising facing up to reality can be.




# Radio Silence by Alice Oseman




#### I'm a Gay Wizard by VS Santoni

When they use spells to defend themselves from bullies, they suddenly find themselves whisked away to the **Marduk Institute**, a school for wayward wizards.


Johnny and Alison must now adapt to a new world of spells, fraternities, and cute boys like Hunter and Blake...




#### Odd One Out by Nic Stone


# It's Not Like it's a Secret by Misa Sugiura

#### Queens of Geek by Jen Wilde



# Parrotfish by Ellen Wittlinger






# Being Dan by Donna David


# The Stonewall Riots by Gayle E Pitman

#### Trans Global: Transgender Then, Now, and Around the World by Honor Head


The whole concept of gender identity is being increasingly challenged and words such as non-binary, pansexual, transgender, cisgender and gender dysphoria are becoming commonplace. This book explores the cultures and people of the past who have embraced, challenged or quietly subverted society's expectations about gender. It features the current stories of openly transgender people around the world in positions of power and authority, who are helping to increase recognition and acceptance of the trans community. And, as trans people often start their journeys in their teens, the book explores the experiences of some young people just at the start of their journeys.

Long before he became known for his YouTube videos, Alex Bertie was an isolated, often-afraid transgender teenager looking for answers. In this revolutionary memoir and valuable resource, Alex recounts his life, struggles, and victories as a young trans man. He explores without judgment how complicated all these things can be, and how many equally authentic ways there are to live as yourself and find happiness.




#### Understanding Transgender by Honor Head

Topics covered include gender stereotypes, why there are different toys for boys and girls, being intersex and transgender, cross-dressing and gender around the world. You will also hear from a range of people who share their personal gender philosophies. Poet Anthony Anaxagorou discusses his masculinity, author Holly Bourne writes about the importance of feminism, Krishna Istha explains what it means to be genderqueer and Juno shares her experiences of being transgender. Other contributors and celebrities featured include Miley Cyrus, Lady Gaga, John Legend, Jack Monroe, Caitlyn Jenner, RuPaul, Laura Dockrill, Conchita Wurst, Andrew McMillan and Emma Watson.



#### Wain by Rachael Plummer and illustrated by Helene Boppert

Wain is a collection of LGBT themed poetry for teens based on retellings of Scottish myths. The collection contains stories about kelpies, selkies, and the Loch Ness Monster, alongside perhaps lesser-known mythical people and creatures, such as wulvers, Ghillie Dhu, and the Cat Sith. These poems immerse readers in an enriching, diverse and enchanting vision of contemporary life. The poems in this collection are fun, surprising, and full of a magical mix of myth and contemporary LGBT themes- it is a perfect read for teens who are learning more about themselves, other people, and the world around them. Wain is fully illustrated, and aimed at teenagers. **Rachel Plummer** was commissioned by LGBT Youth Scotland to write the collection, and the commission was funded by Creative Scotland. The book is accessible to all readers, Scottish and not it comes with a glossary, which explains more about the myths in the poems. There is also a section of writing exercises to encourage young readers to write their own poems, inspired by the book.
