


#### A Cinderella Story


This is a story about the importance of friends, both close and far away.



#### Sea Prayer



I would recommend it to anyone who wants to understand more about refugees as people, just like us. Suitable for all ages and available in Arabic & Spanish editions a well as English.




#### Needle

# MICHAEL LEE RICHARDSON

Eastbank Academy pupils chat with BAFTA Scotland award-winning filmmaker, writer and youth worker Michael Lee Richardson who acted as the school's Author in Residence throughout 2021-2022.

#### Kaili: How long have you been a writer?

MLR: A lot of people say they've been writing since they could hold a pen, but that's not my story. I wrote my first script when I was 25, and I think that came from frustration more than anything else - I worked in a shop at the time, and was bored with my job! I loved watching TV and films and reading books, I've always loved stories. BBC Scotland ran a competition looking for new writers to write a comedy series based in Scotland, and I thought it would be a good chance to have a go at something new, and it was good to have a deadline to work towards. I wrote my first script for that. I didn't win the competition, but I got some really good feedback on my work from someone at BBC Scotland, and that really encouraged me to write another one, and another one, and another one - and I guess I just kept going!

#### Milosz: What made you want to be a writer?

MLR: I just love telling stories, I love making people laugh and I love coming up with new ideas, so writing felt the perfect job. Before I started writing, I had already had a lot of different jobs. I worked in a museum for a while, and then I worked as a tour guide around Glasgow - sometimes, if I didn't really know what I was looking at, I'd just make stuff up. I worked in a shop, selling school uniforms. I worked in Greggs. I trained as a teacher, and wasn't very good at it, so I quit. I worked in social media and events. I worked at the GFT. I worked as a youth worker for a long time, and loved it. I suppose, once I'd done all those jobs, I had no choice but to try writing - there weren't many jobs left to do!

#### Freya: What inspires you when you are writing books?

**MLR:** My ideas usually come from a strong image, either something I've seen in real life or something I've seen in a photo or a picture. I see someone and start

to think, who are they? Where are they going? Where have the come from? What's their story? The main idea for my short film My Loneliness is Killing Me came from walking home from work one night - I used to work till quite late, which is great for people watching! - and seeing this person dressed up really glamorously, in this huge fur coat, who looked really, really sad. On the bus home I was thinking, who is that person? What were there expectations for their night? How did they end up so sad? And the story for the film more or less fell into place, on that bus ride!

#### Elliott: How did you celebrate your first book release?

MLR: My first full-length books actually came out during the pandemic, so celebration options were limited to a takeaway and a Zoom launch party, unfortunately!

#### Bug: Is it hard to write books/poems?

MLR: Sometimes! But usually I find when something is hard, it's because something's not really working - and that usually means I have to go back to the start, retrace my steps, take the idea apart and pull out what I really like about it, then try and put it back together again. When an idea is really good, it's really easy to write.

#### Brodie: How do you concentrate on writing for long periods of time?

MLR: With great difficulty! I really like a thing called the Pomodoro Method. It's named after the tomatoshaped timer that's really popular in countries like Italy and Spain (countries where they cook a lot of tomatoes, I guess!). The idea is that you sit down to do some work and set a timer for 20 minutes, then work through the time and stop. You then set your timer for 10 minutes, and spend that time doing anything other than work. Once you've done a few rounds of that, you find you've got a bunch of works, and then you have something to work with.

#### Calvin: What are the stages of writing a book?

MLR: There are lots of different ways to write a book or a script, and people find what works for them. For me, I need to figure out who the characters are and how they relate to each other, and I usually find that the story comes from there. I'm someone who likes to plot everything out, first, and have the story and the plot - how we get from a to b to c - figured out before I start writing. That plotting part is the hardest part, for me, but I need to do it or I find myself getting lost quite quickly! Once I've got that figured out, though, the rest of it comes pretty easily. Putting in the dialogue and the jokes and stuff is the best bit.

#### Lauren: What do you enjoy about writing?

**MLR:** Most of the time I actually don't like writing - I usually have to trick myself into doing any work - but I love the feeling of having written! I love it when you can sit back, and see this whole bunch of words that you've written, this story and these characters you've created, or this idea you've come up with. That's when the fun bit starts, for me, when you can start pulling that into some form to share with other people.

#### Elliott. Do you ever think about retiring?

**MLR:** All the time! Usually when I'm in the middle of writing something and it's not going well! But I don't think I could, really. Even if I wasn't writing as a job or as a career, I think I'd still be coming up with stories in my head.

#### Katie: What are your Top 3 books of all time?

MLR: That's a tough one! My friend once told me that the literary character I reminded him of was Lucy from a book called *Not Wanted on the Voyage* by a Canadian author called Timothy Findley, and I'd never read it so he gave me his copy. Lucy is a mysterious sevenfoot-tall woman with webbed fingers and toes, who dresses incredibly goth and carries a parasol, who is eventually revealed to be the devil in disguise. And my friend was completely right, me and Lucy are very alike! The other ones are *White Teeth* by Zadie Smith, which was the first book I ever read that was all the things I like in a book, fast and packed and funny with a great set of characters; and the *Carry On* series by Rainbow Rowell, perfect for fans of Harry Potter, snappily dressed vampires and gay wizards.

#### Could you recommend some of your favourite books, TV shows, movies, podcasts?

**MLR:** Books: The best book I've read recently was *Rockstar and Softboy*, a graphic novel by Sina Grace

about two gay best friends throwing a party and accidentally summoning a demon - hilarious and fun, and great to see gay friendship represented in stories.


TV Shows: Buffy the Vampire Slayer, my forever favorite!










# J.M. GALE

S4 pupils from Hillpark Secondary School chat with author J.M. Gale about their writing process and debut novel, *Cupid's A Psycho,* a contemporary love story set in Glasgow

#### **EXCLUSIVE INTERVIEW**



Caitlin: Why did you decide to write/publish the book?

**JG**: I like telling stories, at school it was quite literally the only thing I was good at. Every young person who declares a desire to write will be told how tough it is. It's certainly true and early on I felt that I had something to prove. Consequently, my writing could be very dense and indigestible. I now aim for a good story well told.

**Caitlin**: Did you always want to become an author or was it random?

JG: Yes, since childhood though there was a period when I wanted to be a vet. Aged twelve I was put to work shovelling sheep poo. The farmer was amused by the regularity with which I slipped over on sheep placenta. If I had got my science brain together, I would have made a very accident-prone vet.

Caitlin: Have you always enjoyed English and writing?

**JG**: I was lucky to be taught by gifted storytellers. I hated learning about nouns, verbs and adjectives in

primary school as it seemed to ruin an otherwise enjoyable subject. It was only when I was introduced to Philip Larkin that I saw the value in getting technical.

Hannah A: How long did it take you to write the book?

**JG**: Too long. It's set in 2016 and I started it a few years later.

**Hannah A**: How did you start writing it? Did you have a plan?

**JG**: Cupid's a Psycho started with an overheard conversation. I had a good sketch of a plot after a few wrong turns. Once I knew the characters and where they were going to end up, I worked out how to get there without obvious contrivance. I didn't want the reader to have to suspend their disbelief.

**Hannah P**: Were there any characters that didn't make the cut in the book? Why's that?

**JG**: If there were, they could have been cut early on. It can get confusing for the reader and painstaking for the writer, when you introduce too many people too quickly. Core characters need to be identified early on and earn their keep.

**Hannah P:** Why did you use the subjects that are in the book? Are they related to your past?

JG: It's inevitable that my past will have some influence. I would go to great lengths to avoid confrontation whereas Blithe, the central character, often seeks it. I knew many girls like her and I avoided them, an act of monumental snobbery. When it comes to the boys in the book, I knew so many who were supportive friends and many who were almost maternal to younger kids. No one person inspired one particular character but it just seemed they were missing in literature. Many of the kids who had once struggled alongside me at primary school, continued to struggle into their teens and in some cases to unravel. I've watched that process and that certainly influenced one character. This book makes no mention of a prom or dance. These kids sit in their rooms listening to music and come together when parents foolishly go away for the night. That's exactly what I did.

# GLASGOW SCHOOL LIBRARY SPOTLIGHT: LOCHEND COMMUNITY HIGH SCHOOL



Lochend Community High School is a co-educational non-denominational secondary school in Easterhouse, in the north east of Glasgow. The school was originally opened in 1963 and moved into its new campus in 2002.

#### Interview with Lochend Community High School Librarian: Miss Clarke

#### How long have you been the librarian at Lochend?

I have been the librarian at Lochend for 5 years, since September 2017.

#### Why did you become a librarian?

I became a librarian a bit later in the day than some. As I was considering making the big step of changing my career, I wanted to make sure the change was geared towards something I enjoyed. It didn't take me long to settle on librarianship. It might be a bit of a stock response, but I've always loved reading and libraries. I always visit the main city libraries whenever I'm on holiday. I managed three out of four on my last trip to Manchester. Not bad for a two-day visit. Library nerd!

#### What genre(s) of books do you like?

I don't think I'm much of a genre reader as such. Generally, I like modern and contemporary literary fiction. I don't mind a bit of sci-fi, although usually mainly dystopian fiction (it has to be pretty bleak and set on Earth). Some of my favourite authors are Toni Morrison, James Baldwin, Graham Greene,

Agnes Owens, Philip Roth and Christopher Isherwood.

#### What are you currently reading?

They by Kay Dick, which is a recently rediscovered novella, originally published in 1977 - an unsettling, chilling dystopian novel where the mysterious, sinister group 'They' roam English coastal villages seeking to destroy creativity. I can only read one chapter at a time as I feel so overwhelmed with the feeling of dread. Ticks both boxes! (see above). I'm also reading Underground Railroad by Colson Whitehead which is an absorbing and interesting alternate history on the horror of slavery. I'm finding it difficult to put down. It's certainly living up to the numerous awards it's won. I've started but failed to continue with a couple of books recently. They shall remain nameless.

#### What animal do you most identify with?

Turkeys. Apparently, they enjoy listening to music and often loudly sing along. Or so I've read.

As Lochend is a reasonably small school with classes visiting frequently, I have loved the opportunity to get to know the pupils well. This year, we have had regular library visits from pupils in the ENP base. Supporting them with their activities and having a chat with them has been the highlight of my week.

We are a busy and vibrant space with lots going on throughout the year. We have been focussing on supporting the school in their journey towards gaining a Silver Award from LGBT Youth Scotland. I am part of the LGBT Champions Group and we have hosted meetings in the library. The library is also an informal lunchtime meeting place for pupils who are part of the group. They have helped to create displays, chosen books to add to the LGBTQI+ collection and taken part in insightful discussions as to how present the collection. As well as working with Michael, we have also hosted author visits from Tamsin Winter (as part of the Wee Write Festival) and Victoria Williamson. There will be another author event in the new term as part of the SLIF EAL (English as an Additional Language) book group project that we have also been part of over the past school year. Watch this space!

Another high point of the year in the library at Lochend, was working with the University of Glasgow's Whitewater Writers project. A group of our S3s worked collaboratively to write and produce a novel in five days. On the fifth day the novel was uploaded to Amazon and is now available to buy (link here). To celebrate the achievement, we held a signing event in the library, which was attended by other pupils and teachers. It was great to see how well the young people worked together and to see their excitement at getting to hold the finished novel in their hands.

Every year we also celebrate World Book Day, Book Week Scotland and other special times. There are crafts, games, quizzes, other activities, free books and competitions. This year S1 and S2 classes had lots of fun on World Book Day competing to complete an online escape room challenge.

# ORIGAMI PUMPKIN

#### PERFECT FOR HALLOWEEN!

#### Supplies:

1 square of paper of any size or colour. Example: orange and green 21x21 cm





Fold side to side and corner to corner to create the guide lines shown.



Fold opposite corners in towards each other to create a square base, open at the top.



Fold the left and right edges to the centre as shown on the top layer of the square, then unfold.



Use this new fold to open and collapse the flap so the outer edge is folded into the centre.




Repeat steps 3 and 4 on the remaining sides to create a kite shape.



Fold the top paper point down inside to create a triangle. Repeat on all sides.



Fold the bottom point of the triangle up to sit just over the top line. Then unfold the paper as shown.




This stage involves carefully going over all your fold lines to make sure they are crisp and moving in the right direction. This wil make it easier to complete the next stage. Make sure there are alternating mountain and valley folds all around.







Carefully begin to fold the shape back together. The green centre should be folded up towards you, and enclosed by the orange outside. Pinch your way around the shape until you have reached the form on the right.

- 1 large egg


#### **Instructions:**
