




WHO ARE WE?

Our network membership is almost 72% made up of class teachers with a smaller representation from PT's, DHT's and HT's.

Our membership also includes ITE students and academics.



CULTURAL COMPETENCY

Zem spoke of the importance of using language that is inclusive to all the protected characteristics set out in the Equality Act 2010

"Be careful of assuming superiority of one culture over another."

"Our conviction of what is right or wrong is not the same for everyone."

"Make changes within ourselves and influence change wherever we can."

But I don't know much about ()...how will I teach it? I can't be expected to know everything about () -(culture/issue)

Cultural Competency is a journey. It's an approach woven into our everyday lives.

It is...

I have a new () pupil in my class. How do I deal with them?

I'm afraid of saying or doing the wrong thing!

I'm not comfortable teaching () (religion) because I'm not sure I can deal with the attitudes they'll bring from home.

- reflecting on our privileges (or lack of) & being conscious of how these can determine how we relate to and treat others
 about humility and removing fragility from the equation (it's not about us!)
- suspending biases & revising them based on new knowledge & experience
- not assuming that anyone personifies presumed & prescribed 'cultural values'
- ensuring stereotypes are not the determining factor in our relationships
- being aware of how our own cultural values, norms & experiences influence our attitudes, behaviour, and language
- about not 'going along to get along' & calling out harmful practice
- being open, curious, humble, willing to ALWAYS learn, UNlearn & RElearn

We do not need to scrap our traditional topics, instead we must extend our narrative to include the successes and stories of those voices that have been silenced.







Kirsty spoke about how her most recent placement has opened her eyes to the possibility of how to embed global citizenship values into her daily teaching.

She admitted that so far her training on campus, although touching on these areas, has not made explicit links and she encouraged her more experienced teaching colleagues to ensure they are providing this valuable insight and training to their students on placement.


