Parents' Night update and feedback from questionnaire

Thanks to all parents/carers who came along for the parents' night on 22 March. It was wonderful to see so many families represented and to hear how well your children are progressing. On the night we had **86%** of our school community represented. We know that due to family circumstances a number of families could not attend and we are pleased that alternative appointments have been made.

Values

As you know parents/carers were asked for to vote on our school values. Here are the results of this:

We can now share with you the values we have selected for our school.

We opted for **cooperation** over **compassion** as the school vision mentions that we are a community that cares. This gives a really good balance in terms of what we want Golfhill children to be like.

The work on values brings together work over several months:

- creating a new vision for the school
- staff discussing and selecting 14 values from a list of 50 potential values
- Pupil Council considering these 14 values and selecting 9 of them
- Pupil Council working to create child friendly meanings.

We now need to work together to introduce the wider school to these values.

- School and at home work hard to increase their interests and keep them focused and attentive towards learning. This can be done by engaging them in healthy activities at school and homework could be made more interesting too. As parents we need to play our part too.
- Encourage children to use library facilities provided in local area
- More take home work
- Additional workshops for parents to what is being taught and why and how. Health and wellbeing – get back to 1 mile a day initiative, look to offer healthier options at lunch available for all (no matter if early or late sitting)

- Extra support for children who require more help with literacy/numeracy that is tailored to the child's individual needs.
- Daily mile walk/run, lots of outdoor learning and more creative activities (for wellbeing). I
 think the school already does a lot!
- Less homework, more practical, creative and outdoor learning

Here are the ideas from the board in the playground that specifically relate to either literacy, numeracy or health and wellbeing:

- Support for learning worker and linked to EAL teacher to work with groups to sustain support on a daily basis
- More training in additional support and more support for children with diagnosed needs
- Outside educators i.e. industry leaders
- interactive learning
