Dear Parent/Carer,

The school term is well under way now and children are hard at work. By now you will have had the class newsletter home and parents' night so here is some more information about what's going on in across the school. Watch out for bag drops from Karen our Family Support Worker! Lots going on!

Oral Health

We were pleased that Michelle O'Shaughnessey from the Oral Health Team visited the school and met with the new Health Committee. The Committee discussed the range of snacks brought to school and the amount of sugar in them. The children then gathered together a range of snacks and were busy studying the nutritional information. Michelle came to speak to all the children at assembly and we are pleased she also supported at the first Parents' Night. The Health Committee have decided to have **Fruity Friday** – please support this.

Lunch rota

With the new P1 children staying for lunch now, the dining hall is a busy place. P1-3 always get their lunch first and then each day a different upper school stage goes in first. For example it may be P4, P5, P6 and then P7 then next day the order will be P5, P6, P7 and P4 followed by P6, P7, P4 and P5. This system has been in place for some time now and we find this is fair for everyone in the upper school. The rota is on display in classes and in the dinner school to help keep those supervising right!

Partnerships in our community

We are very fortunate to have a number of partners supporting the children with their learning. This term children in the upper school have been working with PEEK Theatre, Sense over Sectarianism with St Denis Primary and Celtic Football Club. This work will continue next term with Reidvale and Impact Arts.

Reidvale will be in training our P5 – P7 children in first aid. P7 children will take part in a 6 week course and P5 and P6 children will take part in a 3 week course. This will count towards the children getting Dynamic Youth Awards. First Aid is an essential life skill and we hope Reidvale will be able to provide some learning opportunities for parents/carers at the same time.

20 children from the upper school will work with Impact Arts on 'Our Bright Future Project'. This is a community art project and the children will be asked what art they would like to see in Dennistoun in the future. There will be a celebration of the community's work in Impact Arts in December so look out for this. Letters have been sent home regarding this.

Early Years Scotland - We are very pleased to partner with Early Years Scotland who will be in school each week running a Stay Play and Learn session for our P1 children and their parents/carers. This will run from 1.15 – 2.45pm and will begin on Thursday 26 October. Karen our Family Support Worker will be there each week too. This is being funded through the Pupil Equity Fund.







PE in Primary 1 - Mrs Robertson from Glasgow City Council's PEPAS team is working with Miss Jamieson and the children on physical literacy. This proved very popular last session and parents/carers will be invited in to hear a little more about it and join in with the fun.

Primary 4 and Primary 4/3 – are taking part in Determined to Dance over in the Whitehill Dance Studio. This is a great opportunity for the children to experience movement and lasts until 6 November.

Primary 5 – Have been enjoying swimming in Whitehill pool each Monday. Some children are really growing in confidence in the water while others are developing their skills. We look forward to seeing how much more they progress in the 13 week block. Mr Hay took the children to Dennistoun library and was very impressed that every child remembered their library ticket and was able to take out a book.
