The ongoing implementation of Glasgow's Connected Learning programme saw our school as the first in the City where all young people and staff were provided with iPads to

support the learning process. It is inspiring to see how our community has embraced the opportunity these bring to make learning more enjoyable and fun, and the additional support it is providing for young people with particular needs. We could not have done it without you, our Parents and Carers; your attendance at the induction evenings and the support you are providing at home is helping pupils to realise the potential these devices provide. The New Year will see the training programme we have devised for staff and pupils continue.

Our commitment to realising the rights and views of our young people is reflected in our successful application for the Rights Respecting Schools Bronze award and already, staff and pupils are working towards the next stage — Silver! Our Pupil Council is a key vehicle for promoting communication with pupils and following consultation with all year groups, we have implemented a revised, more streamlined model. This is proving effective in allowing pupils to raise and discuss issues most important to them. Our new weekly Pupil Bulletin is shared with all pupils through Microsoft Teams and highlights activities and opportunities which may be of interest.

Most notably this term, we have seen a monumental decision which will impact on the future, but not the heritage, of our school. In August 2021, we will welcome both girls and boys to our school community and this brings an opportunity for us to share our inspirational learning environment with young people from our local area and across Glasgow. Each day provides an opportunity to delight in our young people's success but I must highlight my pride in how they conducted themselves throughout the recent consultation process. At school, in the local community and in the large number of media articles which featured the school, the girls shared their views in an articulate, mature and considered fashion, highlighting their passion for their school.






St Therese Relics

Computing

Our girls have been very busy this term, learning about many different aspects of computing.

S1 – Computer components, Digital Literacy and Women in Computing.

We learnt about different parts of a computer, how they work and what parts of the body they resemble.

We also learnt about aspects of Digital Literacy such as how to be a responsible digital citizen and the advantages and disadvantages of social media.

Finally, we did some research to find out about some of the inspiring women in computing. Some of the women had some very interesting stories and have created a range of computing inventions such as the COBOL programming language and WI-FI.









S2 – Developing Scratch skills, building our own games in Scratch

Our S2s have spent time building up their Scratch skills, firstly by familiarising themselves with the Scratch programming language and then by developing analysis, design, and implementation skills by planning and then building their own Scratch games.









Computing

We will move on to cover the final elements of Computer Systems and Web Design and Development in the New Year.

In 1989, governments across the world agreed that all children have the same rights by adopting the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child (UNCRC). These rights are based on what a child needs to survive, grow, participate and fulfil their potential.

Notre Dame High School pupils will learn about their rights by putting them into practice every day. A Rights Respecting School models rights and respect in all its relationships.

World Children's Day

On Wednesday 20 November, our Rights Respecting Schools Steering group hosted a number of events to celebrate World Children's Day and the 30th anniversary of the UN Convention of the Rights of the Child. Pupils from S1-3 took part in a selection of workshops relating to the past, present and future of children's rights around the world. This encouraged the pupils to consider issues that are important to them and how they themselves could become activists for these. Other events that were held throughout the day included a bake sale for UNICEF UK, face painting, a photo booth and a selection of big questions to allow pupils an opportunity to share their views. The event was a huge success and our steering group look forward to hosting similar events in the future.









SOCIAL SUBJECTS

Holocaust Survivor Visit

Mrs McBride, Hope Easton and I had the opportunity to take part in Lessons From Auschwitz. We listened to the testimony of Holocaust survivor Janine Webber, a real eye-opener into the complicated and brutal realities of the Holocaust from a first hand point of view. In Poland, as well as both camps, we visited the nearby market square of Oświęcim, a town once seething with Jewish life and now a painfully silent home to none. Walking through the rooms filled with possessions, shoes and human hair allowed us to humanise the Holocaust - to understand that we didn't just lose a statistic of people, but we lost their individuality, their culture, their religion; everything they brought with them, including their life. The final memorial service we attended in the death camp, consisted of reflection, prayer and hope for the future. The whole experience was heart breaking, yet incredibly powerful, and left us feeling a great desire to share it with others. Janine Webber told us that even after these historic events, she feels there is hope. With more people forgetting the past and less Holocaust survivors able to tell their stories, now more than ever, we felt like the personification of her hope. To keep alive the memory of the Holocaust is absolutely crucial and a duty we are intent to do our part to fulfil in our newfound role as Holocaust Educational Trust Ambassadors.

Anne Frank Exhibition

Many of our Notre Dame community attended a guided tour including pupils from S1-S6 and some Primary 7's.
