



## AUTHOR Q+A: DEAN ATTA


Our St Mungo's/Whitehill School Librarian, Katie, caught up with award-winning Glasgow-based author, poet, and performer, Dean Atta (*The Black Flamingo*) to chat about poetry, preforming, and his Stonewall Book Award-winning title, *The Black Flamingo*. Find out more about Dean and his work at deanatta.com

Q: Can you tell us a bit about yourself and how you got into writing and performing poetry?

DA: I grew up in Wembley in North West London with my mum and my younger sister. I got into writing poetry as a way to express things I was angry, upset or confused about. For example, my dad not being around, being mixed-race and being treated differently because of it, and knowing I was gay but not feeling ready to tell anyone.

Q: Where does the confidence to perform come from?

I got the confidence to perform my poetry when I started showing poems to friends and they encouraged me to share them at open mic events. The first one I went to was at the Poetry Cafe in Covent Garden. I was already familiar with Central London and confident with performing because when I was younger I performed in musical theatre shows in the West End.



Q: What type of issues do you engage with in your work?

DA: My poems still engage with the themes of sexuality and race but now I'm an uncle I also write poems about my nieces, and now I'm in a longterm relationship I also write poems about my boyfriend.

Q: You shifted from poetry to fiction with your first novel, *The Black Flamingo*. How did that come about and can you describe the plot?

DA: I got into writing fiction because of the encouragement of my agent and my editor, who explained that fiction had the potential to reach even more people than poetry. I saw writing a novel as an exciting challenge. For the plot I decided to stick to a subject I knew well: a mixed-race gay boy coming to terms with his sexuality, and learning to love and accept himself. As a gay man of colour, there wasn't these types of books for you growing up. Arguably there still isn't much.

Q: Was it hard to distil ideas of race, sexuality and gender to a young readership?

DA: It wasn't hard for me because I knew these experiences like the back of my hand. I drew from my own life and also from stories black gay friends told me about their childhoods. I also shared work-in-progress with school groups when I was writing the book and asked for feedback to make sure it felt engaging and relevant for teenage readers.

## Q: Do you think poetry is prevalent in our everyday life?

DA: Definitely! Just look at Valentine's Day, weddings and funerals, we use poems to express how we feel about love and loss. You don't have to write poetry in order to engage with it, you might find a poem that expresses almost exactly how you feel about something and use it as a way of communicating with others. I've even seen poems used in advertising like the Nationwide adverts, which many of my friends have appeared in.

### Q: What advice would you give to your teenage self?

DA: I'd tell my young self that there's no need to rush to be successful, to know exactly what you want to do with your life, to find love, it's all gonna happen at exactly the right time. Work hard at school and university but make sure you nurture your relationships with family and true friends. You don't need to rush to try and be independent because independence is a myth, it's okay to need people and to receive help and support. Writing poems about your feelings is good but so is talking to people you trust, you don't have to keep all your feelings secret between you and your notebook.



### Q: At school, did you get any encouragement to be creative?

DA: Throughout my school career I was encouraged to be creative in different ways. In primary school I was in the school choir and I was also acting in professional musical theatre productions. In secondary school I still did some singing and acting in school productions, I also did A level drama, however I didn't do much else creatively other than write and perform poetry.

## Q: Was your artistic side something you felt you had to hide from your peers?

DA: No, everyone was really cool about it, I think it made me more interesting to them. When I used to get Wednesday afternoons off primary school to do matinee performances in the West End, my friends were jealous but in a friendly way. When I was writing poems in secondary school, my friends were very kind and supportive. I didn't really worry what those outside of my friendship group thought about me.

### Q: Did you use your school library?

DA: At the beginning of secondary school I used the school library as a quiet place some lunchtimes and a place to do my homework. But towards the end of my time at school I was more often found in the drama studio hanging out with the other students from my A level drama class.

### Q: Was there a particular poem or teacher that heavily influenced you?


DA: My biggest influence was my drama teacher Mr Rattigan. He was also my form tutor, so I saw more of him than other teachers. He was pretty relaxed about us hanging out in the drama studio at break and lunchtime. I remember that room being full of laughter and play, it felt like a safe space, I could be myself there more than anywhere else.


## **NEW KID** by Jerry Craft




## **ALL ABOUT JASON**
