## Rational



At St Patrick's, we facilitate outdoor experiences which help our children engage in physical activities and encourage them to develop positive habits with maintaining a healthy lifestyle.

Learning outdoors can be a far more positive experience as it helps to reduce feelings of stress and provides children with problem solving strategies which allow them to think creatively; some children struggle to do this easily in their classroom environment, and so taking the learning outdoors helps to increase their self confidence in tackling tasks independently.

Most of all, it is fun! Where fun is to be had, learning follows, as our children are less inhibited to communicate to one another their thoughts and ideas; allowing them to develop important social skills which they will take with them throughout their lives.

- Promote and improve health and wellbeing of all learners
- Build valuable lifelong skills such as communication, problem solving, information technology, working with others and thinking skills
- Enable children to make cross curricular links through learning experience and apply this independently






### **Resources and Links**
