STEPPING UP TO S4

- At least 2 hours per subject per week
- Success in S3 exams is no guarantee of success in S4.

N5 Modern Studies Case Study, 2024/25 cohort:

- 70 pupils in the cohort
- 78% passed the S3 exam (22% failed)

What did the successful pupils do?

- 30% became N4
- 5% sat the N5 exam but did not pass
- So, 35% of the cohort did not achieve N5

STEP AND MATCH THE CHALLENGE (N5→HIGHER)

- **Progression Tables** are data made by the SQA which show progression from N4 to N5; N5 to Higher; Higher to Adv Higher within a subject.
- E.g. What do pupils that get a B at N5 English go on to get at Higher?

- 30% (7% + 23%) go on to get a B or better at Higher, 70% do worse...
- Success at N5 is no guarantee of success at Higher. Higher is considerably harder.
- How did the 30% who matched or bettered their N5 result do it?

Multi-store model of memory




Fighting forgetting by spacing reminders

Model of memory





FIGHTING AGAINST FORGETTING



RECALL TIME

Now Recall the 10 words that were shown a few slides back.

Debrief

What we would expect is most people will remember most of the words, but not all.

Usually recall is better for first and last words.

This shows how memory naturally fades quickly without reinforcement.

Forgetting is normal – but practice fights forgetting.

WHAT IS RETRIEVAL PRACTICE?

- Quizzing by going into your long term memory to retrieve information and bringing it into your working memory to answer questions/problem solve/perform.
- It is vital that quizzing is done without notes.
- This makes studying more stimulating, more effective but more challenging.
- Challenge is part of learning.

Brain-dumps A.K.A. Free Recall

PRACTICAL TAKEAWAYS

Encourage recall, not just rereading

Ask "Tell me what you learned today" rather than "Did you revise?"

Promote short, regular study blocks instead of last-minute marathons

- 25 Mins study & 5 mins break
- Most people's optimal focus window is 30-50 mins before attention and recall start dropping.

Support Routines

Same time/place for study helps habits stick.
