

Pupil Absence

Glasgow's primary schools encourage good attendance at all times. Parents/carers are asked to inform the school if their child is going to be absent. This should be done before 08:45 on the first day of absence through the pupil absence line on 0141 287 0039. The line is open from 08.00 - 15.30, Monday to Friday.

If the child is going to be absent for some time, it would be helpful to know at the earliest opportunity. The school may send text messages or make phone calls to find out why pupils are not at school, if no contact is made.

Attendance figures are closely monitored, and when they fall below certain levels (see below), further action may be taken.

98% attendance or more	above national average
95% - 97% attendance	in line with national average
90% - 94% attendance	may begin to impact attainment
80% - 89% attendance	letter sent home
Less than 80%	may lead to visit from Home School Support Worker

Please support your child to be on time as late-coming disrupts teaching and learning, and changes to routine can cause upset or distress.

We also ask that you are on time to collect your child(ren) at the end of the day.

Reminder: our school hours are 09:00 – 15:00.

Enrolment for Primary 1

Registration for Primary 1 takes place online in November and is advertised in nursery schools and the local press. Families are welcome to visit the school, and should contact the school office to arrange this.

Families living outside our catchment area are welcome to make a placing request to attend Wallacewell Primary School but must first enrol their child at their local school.

Medical and Healthcare

We have visits from a school nurse, dentists, opticians and other health professionals at various times during the year.



If children become ill during the course of the school day, they may require to be sent home. Please ensure all contact details are kept up-to-date.

Families should inform the school of any medical requirements relating to their child. If a child requires medication during the school day, the appropriate medical form must be completed at the school office.

If your child has an <u>unavoidable</u> appointment, please contact the school office and then collect them from the school office at the specified time.

Emergency Contact Information

At the start of each school session, an annual data check will be carried out. Please ensure that we have all up-to-date and relevant information.

It is also important that you let us know if there are changes to your telephone number(s), or to those of your emergency contacts, throughout the year.

Emergencies

We make every effort to maintain a full educational service but on some occasions circumstances may arise which lead to disruption.

Schools may be affected by, for example, severe weather, temporary interruption of transport, power failures, difficulties of fuel supply or industrial action.

In such cases, we shall do all we can to let you know about the details of our closure or re-opening by using letters, texts, email or social media.

Clothing and Footwear Grants

Parents/carers receiving Income Support, Job Seekers Allowance (Income Based), Working Tax Credit (with a total annual income of less than £15,050*), Housing Benefit, or Council Tax Benefit will normally be entitled to monetary grants for footwear and clothing for their children.

School Uniform

We are very proud of our school uniform at Wallacewell Primary School. School uniform plays a key role in promoting pride, self-confidence, and a feeling of belonging within the school community. Our uniform was agreed in consultation with pupils and parents. We encourage all of our pupils to adhere to our dress code.

The school uniform at Wallacewell Primary is:

- Gold Polo shirt
- Red cardigan/sweatshirt
- Grey/black trousers
- Grey/black trousers skirt

Pupils are asked to bring a pair of indoor shoes to school which must be worn whilst in the school building. This helps us to keep our school clean and safe for all pupils throughout the school day.

Please note, there is no obligation to buy these. Plain clothes without the badge, but in the school colours as noted above, are perfectly acceptable.

A pre-loved uniform bank is available in our foyer. You can take whatever you need, and donations are always welcome!

PE Kit

Children have two hours of PE each week. One session takes place indoors and the other outdoors. It is important that pupils come prepared to learn, and for PE this requires appropriate clothing whether this be indoors or outside.

As per Health and Safety guidelines, all jewellery must be removed.

Pupils who are not to participate in PE must have a note or medical certificate. Pupils who are unable to participate in practical PE should still bring their kit to allow them to assist in the lesson by refereeing, keeping scores or assisting with the distribution of equipment.

This ensures that they are still able to take part in some way in the work of the class and do not miss out on the knowledge and understanding of the course.

There are forms of dress that are unacceptable in school, such as clothing which:

- May encourage factions (such as football colours)
- Could cause offence (such as anti-religious symbolism or political slogans)
- Could cause health and safety difficulties (such as jewellery)
- Could cause damage to flooring
- Carries advertising, particularly for alcohol or tobacco
- Could be used to inflict damage on other pupils

Dress for the Weather

Please send your child to school with appropriate clothing for the weather in Scotland: rain, sun, hail, wind, cold and snow. The children will be outside before school, at break time and at lunch time, in addition to taking their learning outside.

Please note we do not keep the children inside, except in extreme circumstances.

Thank you for your cooperation with this.



School Meals

Lunch service is provided by Fuel Zone dining staff, who offer a variety of meals and snacks. There are always vegetarian and halal options, and medical diets for children can be provided.



All children in P1-P5 are entitled to a free school meal. Children who prefer to bring packed lunches can join their friends in the dining area.

Lunch options are available to view in advance on the *ParentPay* website, and choices should be made in advance. All families are required to create a ParentPay account. Unique activation codes can be obtained from the school office.

If you plan to send your child/children to breakfast club (£2 per child, no more than £3 per family) you should inform the staff of any medical or dietary requirements.

Children and young people of parents/carers receiving Income Support, income-based Job Seekers Allowance, Working Tax Credit, Child Tax Credit only, Universal Credit and income-related Employment and Support Allowance are entitled to a free meal. Transport

The education authority has a policy of providing free transport to all pupils who live out with a certain radius from their local school by the recognised shortest walking route. Transfer from Primary to Secondary School

Children and young people normally transfer between the ages of 11½ and 12½, so that they will have the opportunity to complete at least 4 years of secondary education. Families will be informed of the school arrangements no later than December of P7.

Secondary staff work with pupils from P6 onward to prepare them for this transition.

Communication with Families

At Wallacewell School we use a variety of methods to keep in touch:

- Open Door Policy: the Senior Leadership Team are available to speak to families if they are not teaching or in another meeting. Please pop in to the school office or phone for an appointment. They are also in the playground at the start and end of each day.
- *Newsletters:* these will be issued, on the school website, on a regular basis to keep families informed about the work of the school.

- *Class Newsletters:* termly newsletters will keep you updated about the learning and teaching taking place in classes.
- *Letters:* further information which requires a response may be sent out in letter form.
- *Text messaging:* you may also receive text reminders about events.
- *Meetings:* Parents/carers are welcome in the school to discuss any aspect of their child's development and progress, but it is advisable to make an appointment. There are various planned opportunities throughout the year when parents/carers can discuss progress with the class teacher.
- *Showcase events:* There are other events throughout the school year such as workshops, class performances and open afternoons.

Data Protection – use of information about children and parents/carers

We collect information about children attending school (and also about families, emergency contacts etc. provided in the annual data check) to allow us to carry out the Council's functions as the education authority for the City of Glasgow.

This may sometimes involve releasing personal information to other agencies and other parts of the Council, particularly in relation to child protection issues or criminal investigations, or with health professionals. It may also be used for research purposes (see the link below for more details regarding this).

Information held by the school is, in legal terms, processed by Glasgow City Council. The Council is registered as a data controller under the Data Protection Act 2018 and all personal data is treated as confidential and used only in accordance with the Data Protection Act, the General Data Protection Regulations, and the Information Use and Privacy Policy approved by the City Council.

Each of our nurturing establishments contribute to the development of Glasgow as a nurturing city, creating safe environments which allow our children and young people to flourish by raising attainment and promoting positive mental health and wellbeing.

Curriculum for Excellence 3-18



Curriculum for Excellence aims to raise standards of learning and teaching for all 3 to 18 year olds. It aims to help prepare children and young people with the knowledge and skills they need in a fast-changing world.

As part of Curriculum for Excellence, all children from pre-school to the end of S3 receive a rounded education known as a Broad General Education (BGE). Curriculum for Excellence is all about bringing real life into the classroom and taking lessons beyond it.

First	To the end of P4, but earlier or later for some
Second	To the end of P7, but earlier or later for some
Third & Fourth	S1-S3, but earlier for some

We are committed to providing children with a broad general education, focussing on eight curriculum areas:

Expressive arts: The inspirational power of the arts plays a vital role in enabling children and young people to enhance and develop their creative talent and artistic skills.

Health and wellbeing: Learning in health and wellbeing ensures that children and young people develop the knowledge, understanding and skills which they need now and in the future to help them with their physical, emotional and social wellbeing.

Science: Science, and its practical application across different workplace settings is central to our economic future, for our own health and wellbeing, and that of society.

Social Studies: Through social studies, children and young people develop their understanding of the world by learning about other people and places both past and present, and their societies, beliefs and values.

Religious and moral education: Religious and moral education includes learning about all major world religions, and supports the development of beliefs and values.

Languages: Knowing other languages and understanding other cultures is a 21st century skill set for students as they prepare to live and work in a global society. In Wallacewell, children are taught French.

Mathematics: Mathematics equips us with the skills we need to interpret and analyse information, simplify and solve problems, assess risk and make informed decisions.

Technologies: The range of subjects in technical education has changed significantly over the last two decades and now includes ICT, craft, design, engineering and graphics.

Assessment and Reporting

Children are assessed both formally and informally throughout the year. This allows children and their teachers to identify their strengths and areas for improvement. A variety of assessment methods are used to enable staff to pass on information to parents/carers about the progress of their child.

Assessment records are kept by the class teacher and form the basis of discussion at Parent Evenings in November and March. An annual report is sent home towards the end of each school year.

This highlights progress in key areas such as literacy and numeracy, and celebrates other successes we have had. It also contains highlights of our School Improvement Plan.

We always welcome your thoughts, opinions and feedback on how we are doing, so please do not hesitate to contact us at any time. However, we do undertake a big family survey at the end of each school year and other smaller consultations through the year. We would encourage all families to participate in these.

Promoting Positive Behaviour

Children's Rights as outlined in the UNCRC (United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child) are fundamental to a good school ethos. Adults in our school work with the children to ensure they are aware of their rights and fully respect the rights of others. Therefore, the approach within Wallacewell Primary School is to build a positive ethos and develop positive relationships that demonstrate care and respect for all.

The highest standards of behaviour are expected of pupils at all times. Where this is not the case, a variety of sanctions are used. Families are asked to co-operate with the school in encouraging a sense of responsibility and good behaviour in their children.

Pupil Voice

Our pupils are involved in different groups within the school setting. Our main committees are the Pupil Council. Rights Respecting Schools Group and Eco Committee, but we also have Junior Road Safety Officers and Playground Leaders.

These groups encourage and lead the pupils' voice for change and improvement within the school.

Pupils learn about a range of religions, and their associated beliefs, festivals, traditions and symbols etc. We celebrate the diversity of our school community.

Families from religions other than Christianity may request that their children be permitted to be absent from school in order to celebrate recognised religious events.

Only written requests detailing the proposed arrangements will be considered. Appropriate requests will be granted on up to 3 occasions in any 1 school session.

A wide range of activities run between Monday – Thursday. These extend the learning experience after school and at lunchtimes. Please check your child's schoolbag and your emails for information as places are popular and usually limited.
