

The CLD Fringe Programme

The CLD Standards Council for Scotland

The CLD Village and CLD Fringe programme are sponsored by the CLD Standards Council for Scotland.

The CLD Standards Council for Scotland is the peer-led body responsible for the registration of CLD practitioners, the approval of training courses, and the continuing professional development of the sector workforce. Over 60 practitioners make up our four committees. Through our Ideas Academy, we are developing dialogue, debate and conversation that encourage us to lead, think and act beyond boundaries. Community Health Exchange (CHEX)

We promote and support community-led health - where local communities identify the issues that are important to them and organise to take collective action to address these issues and improve their health. If you are a local group in Scotland working to improve the health of your community, or if you are in the statutory sector supporting this type of work, you can register with us for information, advice, networking and training opportunities.

The Duke of Edinburgh's Award

The Duke of Edinburgh's Award (DofE) is a programme of practical, cultural and social activities which supports the development of young people. It gives opportunities for personal achievement through adventure, volunteering in the community, personal and social development. It is open to all young people aged 14-25. Our mission is "to inspire, guide and support young people in their self-development and recognise their achievements". The Scottish DofE HQ licences 70 Licenced Organisations (LOs) who in turn manage DofE Groups. DofE currently licences all Scottish Local Authority, 29 independent schools and 9 national voluntary organisations.

East Renfrewshire Council: Young Persons Services Team

East Renfrewshire Young Person Services aim to:

- o Increase the life-choices and enhance the life-chances of young people between the ages of 12-25 who live, work and study in East Renfrewshire.
- Promote and deliver informal education for young people by developing their skills.
- Provide opportunities for personal achievement through involvement and accreditation.
- Empower young people to influence policy and service delivery by facilitating engagement between young people, service providers and policy makers.

ESOL Practitioners' Network

ESOL provision in Scotland happens in many sectors: CLD, college, voluntary and schools. The provision is as diverse as the learners who access it. The practitioner network meets around four times a year to enable practitioners to come together and share practice. Family Learning Network

Family learning is a powerful method of learning which challenges educational disadvantage, promotes socio-economic resilience and fosters positive attitudes towards life-long learning. The Family Learning Practitioners Network are a collection of practitioners throughout Scotland, who have a shared vision of supporting families in a constructive and meaningful way, directed by the needs of the families. i-develop: learning for CLD

i-develop is the national web-based Framework supporting innovative learning and development for CLD practitioners, based on the values, principles, skills and competences shared by CLD practitioners and employers. The Framework integrates theory and practice that shape CPD for the CLD sector, including peer support, communities of practice, learning journeys and reflection-in-action. Learning Link Scotland

Learning Link Scotland is the national organisation representing the interests of adult education, learning and skills delivered by the Third Sector. We promote, support and represent a dynamic membership of organisations across Scotland. In partnership we develop innovative programmes for professional development and evaluation. Our members provide a wide range of adult education, learning and skills opportunities. They are leaders in addressing inequalities, empowering people and communities, and effecting positive change. LGBT Youth Scotland

LGBT Youth Scotland is the largest youth and community-based organisation for lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender (LGBT) people in Scotland. We run youth and community groups, deliver youth-work in schools and support professionals to include LGBT people through our Charter of Rights programme. Our vision is to empower LGBT young people and the wider community so that they are embraced as full members of the Scottish family at home, school and in every community.

Scottish Community Development Centre

Scottish Community Development Centre (SCDC) is recognised as the national lead body for community development in Scotland. Our vision is for an active, inclusive and just Scotland where our communities are strong, equitable and sustainable. We support best practice in community development by working with agencies and partnerships to achieve effective community engagement and community participation. Our main areas of activity are community engagement, community-led research, community capacity building, community-led health, and planning and evaluation.

Youth Scotland

Youth Scotland is the network of youth groups across Scotland. We are Scotland's largest non-uniformed youth organisation delivering quality programmes, training and information to young people and learning providers.

In addition to our membership of 1,000 youth groups, we also work with a network of more than 500 organisations, including local authorities, schools and colleges, to enable young people to access Youth Scotland's Dynamic Youth and Youth Achievement Awards (placed on SCQF by SQA).

Young Scot

Young Scot is the national youth information and citizenship charity for Scotland. We provide young people, aged 11 - 26, with a mixture of information, ideas and opportunities to help them become confident, informed and active citizens. We do this in a variety of formats, including, face to face, online, books, magazines, phone, etc., so young people can access information in a way they are comfortable with. It is our hope that the information we provide will enable them to:

- Make informed decisions and choices
- Turn their ideas into action
- Take advantage of the opportunities available to them in Scotland and the rest of Europe
- Have the confidence and knowledge to take their place as active citizens in their communities- locally, nationally and globally

No Knives, Better Lives

No Knives, Better Lives (NKBL) is a Scottish Government national youth engagement initiative aimed at empowering young people to make positive life choices whilst highlighting the dangers, consequences and risks associated with carrying knives. The National Delivery Team for NKBL is hosted by YouthLink Scotland.

No Knives, Better Lives is a multi-pronged initiative that reaches out to young people through community engagement; youth diversionary activity; advertising; partnerships with local stakeholders; schools and youth work programmes. Crucially, NKBL is a nationally directed, but locally delivered initiative. Elements of NKBL will be delivered by national partners to all NKBL areas and the majority will be locally tailored - from education and marketing through to diversionary activities.

YouthLink Scotland

YouthLink Scotland is the national agency for youth work in Scotland. We are the national voice for the whole of the youth work sector. Our membership of over 120 organisations and individuals brings together all of the major national voluntary youth work organisations, all 32 local authorities as well as many other national organisations with an interest in youth work and young people in Scotland.

The five major networks coordinated and supported by YouthLink Scotland - the Members' network, the Policy Forum, the National Voluntary Youth Work Organisations Scotland network, the Local Authority Youth Work Managers group (jointly facilitated by CLDMS) and the Youth Work and Schools Partnership - ensure that we are close to the front line of youth work and that our work and voice is driven by the needs of the whole sector.

The strength and reach of YouthLink Scotland as the national agency for youth work has led to us co-ordinating or administering several national programmes on behalf of the Scottish Government, including: the CashBack for Communities Youth Work Fund; the No Knives, Better Lives initiative and the national development of the 16+ Activity Agreements.
