[Funding Scotland Search Engine](#) - The Scottish Council for Voluntary Organisations is the membership organisation for Scotland's charities, voluntary organisations and social enterprises. Find funding for your charity, community group or social enterprise using the free online search engine. From small grants to funding for big capital projects, can help you track down the funding you need to make a difference in your community.

[Arkwright Engineering Scholarships](#)

For S4 students with a strong desire to have a future career as a leader within the Engineering Profession. With a commitment to study one of the following subjects at Higher/Advanced Higher - Engineering Science, Maths, Physics or Computer Science. Successful students receive £600 as part of the Scholarship – to use this funding to support the purchase of components and materials to complete your personal technical projects or enhance your curriculum projects. Alternatively, use the money to purchase text books, reference books, or to fund your attendance on technical courses, summer schools or university open days. Your school receives £400 if you secure a Scholarship which it must spend on equipment, materials or teacher training to enhance the delivery of STEM subjects. Applications are welcomed from early September to mid-January each year. First, your teacher must nominate you on our online portal.

[Digital Xtra Fund](#)

Applications for Digital Xtra's ninth grants cycle, which will support initiatives during the 2024/25 academic year, are now OPEN. Grants up to £5,000 will be awarded to schools and community organisations looking to start up or scale up extracurricular tech activities for young people. Activities must teach children and young people skills and concepts such as coding, robotics, games design, data science and cyber to help inspire Scotland's next generation of digital makers, leaders, and technologists.

To be eligible for a grant award, applicants must meet the following criteria:

- Main Applicant is a UK registered company, registered charity, chartered body, local authority, school, college, or university actively involved in the provision of computing education and/or digital technologies related activities for young people
- The proposed initiative meets the charity's Core Objective
- The grant requested is between £500 and £5,000
- The primary audience are young people aged 16 years or under
- The proposed initiative will commence after 1 July 2024 and be completed by 30 June 2025
- The proposed initiative will be delivered entirely in Scotland
- The activity is considered 'extracurricular' in nature

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[Edina Trust – Science Grant](#)

The Edina Trust offers £700 primary school science grants and £500 nursery science grants. It's quick and easy to access your Edina funding as it is non-competitive, meaning grants are guaranteed if your school is located within City of Glasgow.

Schools can use their grants for science resources, gardening equipment, science weeks, science subscriptions, science visits (in or out of school) and improving school grounds for science.

Deadline to submit form is 14th June 2024.

[Edinburgh Mathematical Society – Schools Enrichment Fund](#)

The Schools Enrichment Fund exists to provide financial support for mathematical activities which fall outwith the normal school curriculum.

Awards will be considered on an ongoing basis. Each institution will be restricted to at most two applications with a total limit of £600 in a single school year, although note that one application can cover multiple activities and it is expected that many applications will be for smaller amounts.

Note also that there is a limit of £125 payable as a fee to commercial organisations or individuals.

[Institute of Physics – The Kelvin Maxwell Fund](#)

The Kelvin Maxwell Fund supports outreach activities in Scotland that reach new audiences and inspire future physicists.

Our programme of Scottish public engagement creates greater curiosity about physics to make it more accessible to young and old alike.

Proposals include: science storytelling events, embedding physics into Scotland's festival scene, engaging with communities in hard to reach places

[Institution of Mechanical Engineers - Schools and Clubs Engineering Challenge Fund](#)

Enables awards to be made to support initiatives, projects, activities in schools and clubs which promote mechanical engineering to children in primary and secondary education. The award is open to any individual, educational establishment or club. (Value of award – up to £2000.)

[International Centre for Mathematical Sciences – Public engagement activities](#)

ICMS invites proposals from groups or individuals wishing to run training events, engage with the UK mathematics public engagement community to develop best practice, or any other relevant public engagement activities. There is no set format; events could range from a PE session within a larger Maths conference to a stand-alone maths PE event.

[Learning through Landscapes Local School Nature Grants Programme](#)

This outdoor learning grant fund has two elements – a fully funded outdoor learning training for your staff and £500 of equipment for outdoor learning.

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[Microbiology Society - Education and Outreach Grants](#)

Grants of up to £1,000 are available to support relevant science teaching or promotion initiatives, or to support developments likely to lead to an improvement in the teaching of any aspect of microbiology. Eligible membership categories: Full, Full Concessionary and Postgraduate Student Members. Enquiries about this scheme should be made by email to grants@microbiologysociety.org

[The Royal Society – Partnership Grants](#)

The Partnership Grants scheme funds schools up to £3,000 to run investigative STEM projects in partnership with STEM professionals from academia or industry. Next deadline – End of April

[Royal Society of Chemistry – Inclusion and Diversity Fund](#)

Our Inclusion and Diversity Fund provides financial support for innovative products, activities and research projects that do just that. Previous recipients of our funding have included projects related to gender, disability, socio-economic background, language, race and ethnicity, the LGBT+ community and more. These have been delivered via initiatives such as data collection and analysis, workshops and conferences. We will consider individual applications up to the value of £5,000. Funding greater than £5,000 may be considered for one project each year. Application submissions open until 22 April 2024

[Royal Society of Chemistry – Chemistry Teaching Empowerment Fund](#)

Up to £600 (£690) towards the cost your own collaborative project or event to improve chemistry teaching and/or foster supportive and effective chemistry teaching communities. Tackle your teaching challenges in chemistry, get to know your fellow chemistry teachers and technicians, and develop your leadership skills at the same time. You can also tap into the Royal Society of Chemistry's (RSC's) expertise and get advice on setting up your event or collaborative project from your local education coordinator. Applications open to members of Teach Chemistry until 17 March 2024.

[Royal Society of Chemistry – Primary Science Empowerment Fund](#)

Up to £600 (£690) towards the cost of your collaborative project or event, including your planning time. You can also tap into the Royal Society of Chemistry's (RSC's) expertise and get advice on setting up your event or collaborative project from your local education coordinator. Applications reopen until 17 March 2024.

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[Royal Society of Chemistry – Outreach Fund](#)

We are interested in funding projects and organisations that work with different audiences including youth, families, young carers, older adults or school groups. We are particularly interested in funding work with under-served and under-represented audiences including people with disabilities and people facing social, economic and educational disadvantage. You can apply for a small grant of up to £5,000 or a large grant of between £5,001 and £10,000. Grants are for 12 months and will be paid in Sterling.

[SSE Renewables - Community Investment Funds](#)

SSE Renewables operates 38 community investment funds across Scotland and England, for community and charitable projects. These funds are available in Argyll & Bute, Ayrshire, Dumfries & Galloway, Highlands & Islands, Moray, Perth & Kinross, Scottish Borders, South Lanarkshire, The Sustainable Development Fund is in addition to the local community funds and supports strategic projects in the regions where SSE is operating (Dumfries and Galloway, Highlands, Perth and Kinross, Scottish Borders and South Lanarkshire).

[The Wolfson Foundation – Funding for Places](#)

Main grants programme provides support for places. These grants are for capital initiatives, i.e. buildings (new build or refurbishment) and equipment. Opportunities for Special Needs Schools & Colleges, Secondary Schools and Public Engagement with Science Organisations. Minimum grant £15,000, if above £50,000 matching is required.

Stage 1 application open: 1 May 2024 - 10 June 2024

[#AndSheCycles Funding for schools and youth groups in Scotland](#)

The #AndSheCycles Fund is delivered through Sustrans Scotland and backed by the Scottish Government.

The #AndSheCycles campaign aims to address the barriers faced by teenage girls and young women when cycling. This fund is open to groups of young women such as guide groups, school groups and youth groups. The funding is available to help these groups develop and implement plans to help break down the barriers young women face when choosing to cycle. Up to £2000 per group could be available to help purchase necessary equipment to help support more young women cycling. Previous applicants have secured funding for: bikes, helmets, bike pump station, secure bike storage.

[Armourers & Brasiers' Company – Grants for School Science](#)

Schools use our Grants for School Science to purchase equipment so that students can enjoy practical science, to run science enrichment projects in schools, or to enable students to participate in science events and competitions.

The grants are given in standard amounts - £600 for primary schools, £1,000 for secondary schools.

Hope to reopen applications in January 2024.

[British Science Week – Community Grants](#)

This scheme offers grants of £500 and £1000 for community groups working directly with audiences that are traditionally underrepresented and not engaged in science activity.

- £500 grants to run one or more events during British Science Week
- £1000 grants to run one or more events during British Science Week, as well as either preparatory or follow-up activities that will lead to continued engagement beyond British Science Week.

[British Science Week – Kickstart Grants](#)

- **Kick Start Grant:** A grant of **£300** for your school to run an activity during British Science Week.
- **Kick Start Youth Grant:** A grant of **£150** for students aged 10-19 at your school to organise and deliver an activity during British Science Week.
- **Kick Start More Grant:** A grant of **£700** for your school to host a science event or activity that involves your students and the local community.
- **Kick Start Grant + Youth Grant:** A combined grant of **£450** for your school to run an activity during British Science and an additional activity organised and delivered by students aged 10-19.

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[Crest Award – Engage Grants](#)

The CREST Awards scheme aims to inspire young people to think and behave like scientists and engineers. It is the BSA's flagship programme for young people, providing science enrichment activities to inspire and engage 5 to 19 year olds.

Engage Grants are available twice a year to help support UK schools to run CREST Awards. Schools that have high numbers of pupils who are often underrepresented in STEM are encouraged to apply for funding of up to £600 (£300 plus voucher codes to cover CREST Award registration fees) in the Autumn and Spring terms.

Deadline 6 February 2024.

[The Ernest Cook Trust – Outdoor Essentials Grant](#)

£500 per school to fund outdoor clothing, or for projects that provide nature on the doorstep, including the purchase of Outdoor Learning resources that engage young people with the environment such as bug hotels, bird boxes and mini-beast investigation kits.

[Institute of Physics – Anthony Waterhouse Fellowship](#)

If you are a teacher (working in a UK secondary school or college catering for students aged 11 to 19), and have an idea about physics teaching that you'd like to develop, the Anthony Waterhouse Fellowship can help. The grant is £2,000, in two payments, plus up to an additional £1,500 that you can use for: travel expenses, materials and software, services that will help you develop your idea into something other teachers can use.

Will also support you with contacts to physics education researchers and our network of experienced teachers. Applications are currently closed.

[The Institution of Engineering and Technology – Engineering Education Grant Scheme](#)

Supports UK-based educational projects which increase engineering knowledge, improve wider engineering literacy and bring about a better understanding of the role of the engineer, and the contribution engineering makes to society, among young people aged 4-19. Any UK project aiming to promote a better understanding of engineering, inspire young people to study STEM subjects or raise awareness of engineering and technology-based careers could be funded.

[The Linnean Society - Our Local Nature Grant Scheme](#)

The Our Local Nature Grant scheme is designed to provide young people with an opportunity to take the lead on projects that involve their local nature and natural spaces, to aid young people in realising their influence to affect positive change, to have their voices heard, and see their ideas come to life. We therefore fund innovative projects that are designed and led by young people in the UK. Adult applicants should develop their proposal alongside young people and the projects should seek to empower local young people to enact changes they want to see, such as increasing access to natural spaces and improving understanding of their local biodiversity. The maximum award is £1,000 per proposal. We welcome and encourage applications for significantly lower amounts - in the last two years we have funded a wide spread of projects ranging from £150 to £1,000. The Society is happy to co-fund any project with other organisations.

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[Maths Week Scotland](#)

Two different funding opportunities available for Maths Week Scotland 2023 depending on the size of your project: Large Grants Fund and Small Grants Fund.

[The Rolls-Royce Schools Prize for Science & Technology](#)

An annual awards programme that helps teachers increase science, mathematics, and technology engagement in their schools and colleges. The awards programme is open to all schools and colleges in the UK. Your initiative can focus on any area of science, mathematics, or technology, and it can be either a new idea or development of something you're already working on. The most important thing: think innovative!

- Each year up to 50 schools are awarded a £1,000 Special Merit Award (SMA) for STEM teaching in school.
- Special Merit Award winners will automatically be entered into the finalist short-list and a chance to win the coveted The Rolls-Royce Schools Prize for Science & Technology, formerly known as the Rolls-Royce Science Prize.
- If you are selected as a finalist, you will be provided with a further £5,000 to implement your action plan in the second year of this two-year rolling awards programme. You will also receive additional support from Rolls-Royce, who will work with you for the full academic year to help you implement your action plan.

[Royal Academy of Engineering – Ingenious Public Engagement Awards](#)

Ingenious is an awards scheme for projects that engage the public with engineers and engineering while providing engineers with skills and opportunities in public engagement.

We prioritise projects that reach diverse and underrepresented audiences including communities in the most deprived neighbourhoods in England, Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland and that engage with engineers and people of different genders, ages and ethnic backgrounds. All projects and project teams should be based in the UK. Funding from £3,000 to £30,000 is available. Deadline – 4pm 20th September 2023.

[Royal Institution Science in Schools grant scheme](#)

Fully funded school visits worth £800 are offered for students, teachers, and families to experience a Royal Institution Science in Schools day. This grant covers the full package of two performances of a school show of your choice for students, a CPD session for teachers, and an after school or evening community show for a family audience. The next round of applications will open in May 2024, and can register your interest on website.

[The Royal Society of Biology – Outreach and Engagement Grant](#)

The RSB offers a number of grants to help members of RSB who are looking to run outreach and engagement events. Our Outreach and Engagement Grant Scheme is now open to applications until 1st July 2023. If you have an idea for an outreach event or activity and are looking for some additional funds to help make it a success, you can now apply for up to £200, £500 or £1,000 towards event costs. Will reopen in June 2024.

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[Royal Society of Chemistry – Technician Travel and Training Grant](#)

Range of funding opportunities (£800-£2000) that supports technicians working in all sectors (for example industry, academia, education or research) to participate in activities such as conferences, training courses and networking events both overseas and in their country of residence, to facilitate their professional development. Applicants require to be member of RSC to access fund.
