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## **Social Communication Differences – Parent Group**

## An Early Language and Communication Improvement Story Board from North Ayrshire

The issue	The team	Our idea
Increasing numbers of children being identified with social communication differences in nursery  Challenges at home and going into social situations  Some parents were feeling isolated.  Parents/carers asking ELC staff for tips/ideas to help support their children.  Support from outside agencies	Jennifer Alexander, Equity and Excellence Lead We Work For Families Speech & Language Therapy	Parents/carers spend most time with their children. If they are given the tools to support their child's SL&C their child will have the best outcome. As some families whose children have additional support needs feel isolated, being able to hear about other families' experience may reduce that isolation.  We considered: How best to engage parents/carers to encourage them to attend the group. Date and time of sessions (think of drop off/pick up times) Comfort breaks included in design of workshop Who might be needed to support them to attend What the content of the sessions/pace of session (mindful of needs of participants) Where would these sessions be held
Tools & resources we used.	<b>What we did</b>	The impact
Utilising the skills they had learned from attending a previous course delivered by We Work For Families to help develop confidence and self-esteem  Identifying families  Springvale's Facebook page for advertising & signup  Using QI methodology learning to inform how to develop this group.	We developed: Two 2-hour sessions Building on previous discussions of content between EYP & SLT All families were invited initially (including local community via Facebook) Families were invited via "Xpressions APP Flyer was given to all families describing group Posters were placed in nursery	It gave the families a network of support.  Reduction in feelings of isolation as the parents shared their stories about their children and commonalities were discovered  Parents were able to try ideas shared to support their child's communication attempts e.g. giving choices.



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Using Hanen strategies/prior knowledge gained from courses delivered by SLT

Having fidget toys for parents/carers when arriving at session (distraction for parents to relax more in the environment)

Feedback from parents was left until end of session to reduce anxiety of parents.

Followed up with a personal invitation to targeted families who we felt would benefit most from the input

Early language strategies, and strategies to support social communication, visuals shared by SLT and practitioner.

EYP shared resources/activities and plans to develop a space for children with social communication differences which they can access for self-regulation and targeted work.

Feedback taken from parents with question "what I'd still like to learn about".

EYP feels that her confidence and skill set has increased by working collaboratively with SLT and being able to share this learning with colleagues

For the children the impact of routine and consistency of approach – parents/carers/EYPs has had a positive outcome.

Feedback was taken at the end of the each session from parents.

Powerful for parents to hear each other's stories



.In response to feedback question "what I'd still like to learn about" 4 Makaton sessions were offered to the parents who attended the 2 parent sessions, 5 families attended.

This work is being further developed. SCD sessions to be offered again next term.

Two other colleagues are delivering a session in May 2024 to continue to share these strategies with parent/carers. Very practical session for parents/carers to learn by doing. Parents/carers are going to make their own visuals to take away from session.

SLT are offering a parent session for those parents in Springvale whose children have social communication differences.
