Using the CYPIC 2022 Theory of Change Model for Early Language and Development as the foundation to our discussions, we planned to explore strategic themes around learning interactions, the environment and planned and prioritised opportunities. By examining each of the secondary drivers we sought to identify best practice in Falkirk and how to scale and spread this to ensure the greatest impact across the sector through planned approaches to CLPL.

Based on the CYPIC 2022 Theory of Change Model for Early Language and Development, the team extended their use of improvement methodologies to adapt and gather data to extend the secondary drivers.	 Over the past year we have met regularly and focussed on the following actions: To develop a shared understanding of specific SLT interventions and how teams are able to engage with these within establishments To create a driver diagram based on CYPIC 2022 Theory of Change Model for Early Language and Development reflecting the Falkirk context To agree core training from SLT that would be prioritised and form part of the Service Improvement Plan To develop specific CLPL for EY Central Team. To gather an overview of establishments with reference to engagement with SLT and EY central team, those who have achieved ACI and Communication Environment Awards, 	Using the CYPIC 2022 Theory of Change Model for Early Language and Development as the foundation to our discussions, the team recognised the importance of adapting the model to reflect the Falkirk context. This included creating an additional secondary driver that highlighted the central role of partnership with parents and families. The team also created a framework for identifying data sources. The power of close collaborative working between education and speech and language colleagues has proven to have had the greatest impact on developing joint strategic approaches to supporting early language development within Falkirk early years setting.
