# Journey from birth to school for children with complex additional support needs

If you care for a child with complex additional support needs we hope this will help explain the teams you may work with as your child progresses towards school. As every child is an individual, the journey may look different for different families.



Every child will have a health visitor or family nurse from 10-14 days old. Your health visitor/family nurse will keep in contact until your child begins school and can provide advice about child development as well as routine screening for developmental concerns.

## **SCPT (Secondary Care)**

Under-5s who need extra support may be referred to a <u>Specialist Community Paediatric Team (SCPT)</u> in one of Glasgow's four <u>Child Centres</u> (Bridgeton, West, Gorbals, Woodside). These teams of paediatricians, speech and language therapists, occupational therapists, physiotherapists and specialist nurses will work with you to identify or diagnose your child's needs and/or medical conditions and can help you find supports.

#### Nursery

Children with complex needs are usually eligible for a funded place at nursery from 2yrs old. Nursery staff will work with you to help your child make the best possible progress. The nursery can also ask external education or health professionals, such as educational psychologists or speech and language therapists, for help. Your child may have an individual plan detailing their targets for learning and how these will be supported.

#### **School**

Children usually go to school in the year they turn 5. School staff will work with you to understand how your child learns and how best to support this. The school can ask other education or health professionals to help. Any plans from nursery should be continued and your child's plan will be regularly reviewed with you to ensure the right level of support is in place.

# Specialist Health Teams (Tertiary Care)

Children who require specialist medical services for particular conditions will be referred to hospital-based teams. They will remain under the care of the team for as long as necessary.

## **Early Years Support Service (Transition)**

Your health worker will refer to the EYSS who will become involved when your child is around 18mths old. They will help you find an appropriate nursery place and work with you, your child and the nursery staff to ensure the transition goes as well as possible.

#### **Enhanced Transition**

In your child's last year of nursery, you and the team around your child will start planning for the move to school. Your child will get support such as extra school visits and chances for you and the team around your child to talk to school staff about how your child learns and what they need to achieve their best.



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# The Team Around Your Child

If you care for a child with complex additional support needs, we hope this will help explain some of the professionals you may work with. Click on the <u>underlined</u> links to find out more.

**EYSS** 

EYSS (Transition) supports children from 18mths with additional support needs to transition into nursery or other early learning and childcare provision.

Sensory Support The Sensory Support <u>Hearing</u> and <u>Visual</u> Services support children with a sensory impairment at home and work with nurseries to help them create effective learning environments and activities.

Physio

<u>Physiotherapists</u> work with children, their families and others involved in their care to support children to reach their physical potential.

SCPT

The <u>Specialist Community Paediatric Team</u> is made up of different health professionals who can help identify your child's needs and provide diagnoses. Watch a <u>video about</u> the work of SCPT at Child Centres.

EP

<u>Educational psychologists</u> work in partnership with families and other professionals to support the inclusion of children in nurseries and schools.

SW Disability Team

<u>Contact Social Work Services</u> to find out more about how they can help.

ОТ

Occupational Therapists provide intervention and/or advice to support children to fully participate in everyday activities.

SLT

Speech and Language Therapists assess and support children with communication and/or eating and drinking difficulties. They can work directly with children but usually work with families and education staff to help them support children.

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#### **Neurodevelopmental Assessment**

If you think your child may have a neurodevelopmental difference (such as <u>autism</u>, <u>ADHD</u> (attention-deficit hyperactivity disorder) or <u>FASD</u> (Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder)), a referral can be made by health or education staff for a neurodevelopmental assessment. These take place at a Child Centre (Gorbals, West, Bridgeton, or Woodside) and will provide diagnostic support.
