Photography

- You have been working on a portrait unit of work in the first term learning about the proportions of the face. Eventually this portrait will be put together with a background to make one picture.
- To give you something that we can incorporate into your unit of work we are suggesting that you do a series of photographs, in the photograph you should be aware that you have a background, mid-ground and foreground.

Task 1

1. Take a set of photographs based on:
 - Corner of your bedroom
 - The most interesting part of your kitchen (sink with dishes, kettle with tea cup, bread board and knife, table with a fruit bowl with fruit) groups of objects
 - Bathroom view of a corner with a few objects (shampoo bottles with soap and a towel, shower door and taps, toilet with mat on the floor)
 - Section of your garden or park
2. Select one photograph
3. Crop photograph using Photograph app.

Task 2

- Try the mono camera mode and produce your photograph in black and white.
- **Produce a tonal study using the black /white cropped photograph**
- **Photograph of work to be sent by glow to your teacher when you are timetabled for that teacher**
- You could use your iPad to take a photograph then crop it down to an interesting composition with at least three objects in the scene ensuring you have a background mid ground and foreground.

Tints and Shades

- Produce a painting of waves using only tints and shades of one colour.
 - Paint the sky the opposite colour of the waves
- **Look at the resources and videos in teams to get started.**

Complementary Colours

- Produce a painting of circles/donuts using complementary colours.
 - Refer to the colour wheel to help pick out complementary(contrasting) colours!
- **Look at the resources and videos in teams to get started.**

Portrait Drawing

- Draw a portrait of yourself, a family member or a friend.
 - No celebs!!
- Video exemplars are in **TEAMS**
- This will introduce you to the proportions of the face and to a way to add shading to a drawing using a pen. This is called cross-hatching and the shading will help make your portrait look more 3-D.
