Dear Parents and Carers

Welcome to St. Angela's Primary School. I hope this handbook gives you a glimpse of life at St. Angela's. We serve the Roman Catholic population of Darnley. However, we also welcome children from other faiths and no faith background. Home, Church and School work together in partnership with your child at the centre. Our Nursery Class is non-denominational.

As Head Teacher it is my intention that your child will receive the highest standard of education possible within a caring, Catholic ethos. I am committed to creating every opportunity for your child to succeed and to be an independent, confident, responsible and successful individual. It is important that your child feels happy, safe and respected in order to fulfil his/her potential and develop an enthusiasm for lifelong learning.

St. Angela's is made up of an open plan main building, opened in 1977 with 7 double class bases, two sets of huts, one housing two classes and the other housing four classes and a nursery class base. The school environment is warm, bright, welcoming and attractive and the school's surrounding grounds are well-cared for. All areas are beautifully displayed with the work of our children.

Our nursery and primary one classes work collaboratively in lots of our activities including, Master Classes, Pupil Committees, assemblies and celebrations. General information about the nursery class can be found later in this handbook.

Our school provides a broad, general education which promotes the aims of the Scottish Executive's 'Curriculum for Excellence'. Our teachers successfully adopt the strategies in the Executive's 'Teaching for Effective Learning'. This is further enhanced by a wide and varied range of educational excursions and experiences for every class as well as offering a great number of after-school activities.

We are an integral part of the wider community and consider our parents to be our partners in the education of our children. We ask parents to support and assist the school's aims, objectives and policies. These are summed up in our mission statement which is displayed in our entrance hall:



Pupil Absence

Within Glasgow Primary School good attendance is encouraged at all times and children rewarded accordingly. Parents are asked to advise if their son or daughter is going to be absent. This should be done as early as possible on the first day of absence. If the young person is going to be absent for some time, it would be helpful to know at the earliest opportunity. The school uses daily text messaging to inform parents and carers of absence if no contact is made. All unexplained absences are investigated by the school and appropriate action taken. All calls must be made to the Pupil Absence Reporting Line on 0141 287 0039. The line is open between 08.00-15.30 Monday to Friday. Medical & Healthcare

The school nurse visits at various times during the year for routine health checks, vaccinations and medical examinations. Parents are kept informed by letter.

If a child becomes ill during the course of the school day, he/she may require to be sent home. Please ensure that you keep the school informed of <u>all</u> contact details.

Parents should inform the school of any medical requirements relating to their child. If a child requires medication during the school day, parents must complete the appropriate medical form. This is available on request from the school office.

Emergencies

We make every effort to maintain a full educational service, but on some occasions circumstances arise which lead to disruption. Schools may be affected by, for example, severe weather, temporary interruption of transport, power failures or difficulties of fuel supply.

In such cases, we shall do all we can to let you know about the details of our closure or re-opening by using letters, texts and the local media etc.

School Uniform

Our uniform was agreed in consultation with pupils and parents. It is expected that all children attending Glasgow Primary School will adhere to this dress code.

PE Kit

It is important that pupils come prepared to learn and for PE this requires appropriate clothing. All jewellery should be removed. Pupils who are not participating in PE must have a note or a medical certificate. Pupils who are unable to participate in practical PE should still bring their kit to allow them to assist in the lesson by refereeing, keeping scores or assisting with the distribution of equipment. This ensures that they are still able to take part in some way in the work of the class and do not miss out on the knowledge and understanding of the course.

There are forms of dress that are unacceptable in school, such as items of clothing which:

- Potentially encourage factions (such as football colours)
- Could cause offence (such as anti-religious symbolism or political slogans)
- Could cause health and safety difficulties (such as loose fitting clothing, jewellery)
- Could cause damage to flooring
- Carry advertising particularly for alcohol or tobacco
- Could be used to inflict damage on other pupils

Clothing & Footwear Grants

Parents/Carers receiving Income Support, Job Seekers Allowance (Income Based), Working Tax Credit (check link below for thresholds), Housing Benefit, Council Tax Benefit or Universal Credit (check link below for thresholds) will normally be entitled to monetary grants for footwear and clothing for their children. School meals

Our school provides a lunch service which offers a variety of meals and snacks. Medical diets for children can be provided. School meals are ordered through the ParentPay system.

Children who prefer to bring packed lunches will be accommodated in a suitable area.

All children in P1-5 are entitled to a free school meal.

Present cost of a school lunch is £1.90 Present cost of breakfast club is £2.00 and £1.00 for every additional family member

If you plan to send your child/children to breakfast club, you should inform the staff of any medical dietary requirements.

Children and young people of parents/carers receiving Income Support, income-based Job Seekers Allowance, Working Tax Credit (check link below for thresholds), Child Tax Credit only (check link below for thresholds), Universal Credit (check link below for thresholds) and income-related Employment and Support Allowance are entitled to a free midday meal. Transport

The education authority has a policy of providing free transport to all pupils who live outwith a certain radius from their local school by the recognised shortest walking route. Transfer from Primary to Secondary School

Children and young people normally transfer between the ages of 11 ½ and 12 ½, so that they will have the opportunity to complete at least 4 years of secondary education. Transition programmes are established with St. Paul's High School in order to ensure a smooth transition for all our children.

Communication with Parents

At Glasgow Primary School we use a variety of ways to keep in touch.

Open Door Policy – the senior leadership team are available for all parents and carers at any time providing they are not teaching or in another meeting. Please either pop in to the school office or phone for an appointment.

Seesaw – will let parents know what homework has been set and is also used to communicate between the class teacher and parents. This app can be downloaded on all platforms.

Newsletters – will be sent out on a regular basis to keep parents informed about the work of the school.

Letters – further information which requires a response may be sent out in letter form.

School website/Twitter – will contain a great deal of information about the school. It is a good idea to check this regularly.

Groupcall/Xpressions app – You may receive emails about events/school closures etc.

Microsoft Forms – This is used to collate information and views from parents and pupils.

Meetings - Parents and carers are welcome in the school to discuss any aspect of their child's development and progress. To avoid disappointment, it is advisable to make an appointment with a member of SLT. There are various opportunities throughout the year when parents can discuss their child's progress with the class teacher and view the child's work.

Parents and carers are welcome at other events throughout the school year e.g. workshops, information evenings, class performances, religious and other assemblies. The school newsletter and website will keep you informed.

Emergency Contact Information

At the start of each school session, parents will be issued with the annual data check form. Please ensure that this is completed and returned to the school. It is also important that you let us know if there are changes to your telephone number(s) or to those of your emergency contacts throughout the year.

Data Protection – use of information about children and parents/carers

We collect information about children attending school (and also about parents/carers, emergency contacts etc. provided in the annual data check) to allow us to carry out the Council's functions as the education authority for the City of Glasgow. This may sometimes involve releasing personal information to other agencies and other parts of the Council, particularly in relation to child protection issues or criminal investigations, and it may also be used for research purposes (see the link below for more details regarding this).

Information held by the school is, in legal terms, processed by Glasgow City Council. The Council is registered as a data controller under the Data Protection Act 2018 and all personal data is treated as confidential and used only in accordance with the Data Protection Act, the General Data Protection Regulations, and the Information Use and Privacy Policy approved by the City Council. Curriculum

Curriculum for Excellence 3-18

Curriculum for Excellence has been introduced to raise standards of learning and teaching for all 3 to 18 year olds. It aims to help prepare children and young people with the knowledge and skills they need in a fast changing world. As part of Curriculum for Excellence all children from pre-school to the end of S3 will receive a rounded education known as a Broad General Education(BGE). Curriculum for Excellence is all about bringing real life into the classroom and taking lessons beyond it.

Through the experiences we provide at St Angela's we want our children to become Successful Learners, Confident Individuals, Responsible Citizens and Effective Contributors. We are committed to providing children with a broad general education and focus on eight curriculum areas.

Progress in learning is indicated through curriculum levels as detailed below.

Early	The pre-school years and P1 or later
First	To the end of P4, but earlier or later for some

Expressive arts: The inspiration and power of the arts play a vital role in enabling our children and young people to enhance their creative talent and develop their artistic skills.

Health and wellbeing: Learning in health and wellbeing ensures that children and young people develop the knowledge, understanding and skills which they need now and in the future to help them with their physical, emotional and social wellbeing.

Science: Science and its practical application in healthcare and industry is central to our economic future, for our health and wellbeing as individuals and as a society.

Social Studies: Through social studies, children and young people develop their understanding of the world by learning about other people and places both past and present, societies, their beliefs and values.

Religious and moral education: Religious and moral education in the Catholic School includes learning about and practising the Catholic faith as well as learning about other Christian churches, Islam, Judaism and other world religions, and supports the development of beliefs and values.

Languages: Knowing other languages and understanding other cultures is a 21st century skill set for students as they prepare to live and work in a global society.

Mathematics: Mathematics equips us with the skills we need to interpret and analyse information, simplify and solve problems, assess risk and make informed decisions.

Technologies: The range of subjects in technical education has changed significantly over the last two decades and now includes craft, design, engineering and graphics.

Ipads: We use Ipads in school to support learning. Primary 5-7 pupils have access to an Ipad each which can be taken home. Nursery and Primary 1-4 pupils have access to Ipads in classes throughout the school day.

There will be opportunities throughout the year for parents and carers to learn more about aspects of the curriculum and to be consulted about significant changes if appropriate.

Religious Observance

The school is committed to the spiritual, moral, social and cultural values of each child in our care. As a Catholic Denominational School the religious education programme used in St.Angela's Primary is This is Our Faith.

Our general aims for Religious Observance are:

• to express, develop and deepen the faith of the individual, school and community

• to celebrate the faith that is being developed in the religious education programme

• to allow pupils of all faiths to experience the community at worship

• to help pupils to confirm and deepen their own prayer life, sacramental life and commitment

Our pupils of the Catholic faith receive the sacrament of Reconciliation at Primary 3 stage. Holy Eucharist is received at Primary 4 and Confirmation at Primary 7. Our pupils who are not of the Catholic Faith gain a unique sense of unity when sharing in the joy of spiritual experiences with their Catholic friends.

School masses are held regularly. Whole school weekly Assemblies bring all pupils together to join in community prayer. At specific times in the Catholic Calendar Assemblies address issues, such as Lent and Advent, in religious observance.

The school adheres to the following advice in the SOEID Circular 6/9:Under Section 9 of the Education (Scotland) Act 1980 and SEED Circular 1/2005 that parents and carers are given the right of withdrawal of their children from Religious Education and Observance. Notwithstanding this, however, parents who elect to send their children to this school are expected to accept the religious tradition and ethos of the school and their children should therefore attend all religious instruction and observance. If any parent should still wish to exercise their rights of withdrawal, they should seek an early interview with the Head Teacher.

Parents and carers from religions other than Christianity may request that their children be permitted to be absent from school in order to celebrate recognised religious events. Only written requests detailing the proposed arrangements will be considered. Appropriate requests will be granted on not more than three occasions (days) in any one school session and the child noted in the register using code REL on these days.

Relationship Education for Primary Schools: The school uses the Archdiocesan resource, God's Loving Plan for Relationship Education for Primary Schools as part of the RERC syllabus. Parental workshops are offered in preparation for the teaching of lessons.

Within the Catholic school we use the self evaluation tool, "Shining the Light of Christ" to ensure the teachings of the Catholic Church permeate all we do.

Assessment & Reporting

All children are assessed both formally and informally throughout the year. This allows children and their teachers to identify their strengths and areas for improvement. A variety of assessment methods are used to enable staff to pass on information to parents about the progress of their child. Assessment records are kept by the class teacher and form the basis of discussion at Parents' Evenings in November and March. An annual report is sent to parents towards the end of each school year.

If you have any concerns about your child's progress do not hesitate to contact the school.

Support for Pupils

The school has a duty to ensure that all pupils have equal access to the curriculum, with appropriate support for their needs if required. This applies to the content of lessons, teaching strategies and minor adaptations to the school environment. There are a wide range of factors which may act as a barrier to learning. We are committed to working closely with parents and carers to ensure that they are fully involved in any decisions about support for their children's needs.

Nurturing City

Nurture is a universal approach which builds resilience, helping to reduce the impact of adversity. Effective communication and collaboration with parents and carers builds an ethos of partnership working putting the child at the centre, fostering high quality learning contexts. Each of our nurturing establishments contribute to the development of Glasgow as a nurturing city, creating safe environments which allow our children and young people to flourish by raising attainment and promoting positive mental health and wellbeing.

School Improvement

On an annual basis, you will receive a copy of our Standards and Quality report. Copies from previous years are available on the school website. The Standards and Quality report highlights progress in key curricular areas such as literacy, numeracy and health & wellbeing. Our priorities for improvement are detailed in our School Improvement Plan which is discussed with our Parent Council. Any parent or carer seeking a copy of the plan can contact the school office or check out our website.

Promoting Positive Relationships

Children's Rights as outlined in the UNCRC (United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child) are fundamental to a good school ethos. Adults in our school will work with children to ensure they are aware of their rights and fully respect the rights of others. Therefore, the approach within St Angela's is to build a positive ethos that demonstrates care and respect for all. Positive relationships among pupils are recognised and celebrated. Our school operates a system of class charters to set out expected behaviour. This is celebrated through recognition at assemblies and certificates sent home to parents etc.

The highest standards of behaviour are expected of pupils at all times. Where this is not the case, restorative practices are put in place. Parents are asked to co-operate with the school in encouraging a sense of responsibility and good behaviour in their children.

Continuing to learn at home helps children to achieve more and is a vital part of our partnership with parents. All classes use Seesaw which is an interactive learning platform.
