COMPOSITION RULES

Composition – For your piece to work as **round**, you need to follow the following rules!

- (a) When choosing your rhythms, make sure the last one you use ends on the longest note.
- (b) Same chords for every line. (This is called a chord progression).
- (c) End on Chord I (this uses C, E and G)
- (d) First note of each bar must be in the chord you lare using.

ROUND COMPOSITION – STEP BY STEP

- 1. Choose your rhythms.
- 2. Choose your chords. Remember each line uses the same pattern.
- 3. Create your melody the first note of each bar needs to be from within the chord you have chosen, but any other notes are up to you! Write the notes you have chosen above your rhythm.




RECORD YOUR COMPOSITION
