'YOU SAID, WE DID'

From January 2018-March 2018 the Senior Management Team were involved in more than 40 learning visits to classrooms to engage in the learning experience and focus on some of our most able students from \$1-\$6. We also collected information by speaking to staff, students, the Parent Council, Inverclyde Education Services and we asked some parent/carers to share their views with us via a questionnaire.

Here are some of the things we found:

<u>In class</u>

- Quality questioning led to higher order thinking skills and was challenging and open ended.
- There were very positive relationships.
- Group work was well planned and often the most able students were given leadership roles which challenged them.
- Staff regularly communicated high expectations throughout lessons.
- Particularly in the senior phase, tasks were planned to encourage more independent working.
- Staff made themselves available for additional support during lessons, intervals, lunchtimes and after schools.

From speaking to students

- Students felt supported, challenged and enjoyed learning.
- Felt the pace of learning was appropriate.
- Were confident that they could ask staff for help particularly when organising their own learning.
- Would like more praise when they do well.
- Would like to know when they would get homework returned with feedback.

From Parental/Carer questionnaires (rating from 1 to 10, with 10 being most positive

- Quanitity of homework 8.7
- Challenge within homework 8.4
- Feedback on homework 8.0
- Aware of success in class 9.1

In addition to this, a number of parent/carers commented on the great environment for learning and support from staff.

The information which we gathered has been very positive, however we would like to focus on two areas of improvement. I have shared this information with all staff and students should now find that:

- 1. When they are issued with homework and given a date for it to be handed in, they should also be told when it will be returned to them and what type of feedback they will receive on it.
- 2. Staff will celebrate their success more clearly, offering appropriate praise for their hard work and effort.

Inverclyde Enterprising Maths Competition

The annual Inverciyde Enterprising Maths Competition took place in St Stephen's on the 13th September.

The competition involves teams of pupils from \$3 and \$4 (or in our case, \$3 only!) competing against each other in a series of challenging mathematical problems. Good teamwork, communication and problem solving skills are essential!

Huge congratulations then to our WINNING (with a record-breaking score!) team of **Bobby** Stone, Hannah MacLellan, Sadie Anton and Wladek Zawadzki, who will now go on to represent Inverclyde at the Enterprising Maths in Scotland National Final 2018, to be held in the Glasgow Science Centre on Tuesday 6th November.

- Q How can you be sure you have counterfeit money?
- A If it's a £3 note you can be sure.

Recently the Telegraph ran an article about the conditions necessary to manufacture electronic devices. Apparently high humidity and low dust particles – our weather – makes Inverclyde a highly suitable destination for their manufacture. We may not have IBM, and National Semiconductor anymore, however, there is still a place in schools to develop these skills for Research and Development occupations and further study.

S2 iPad Art Deco feedback


I've been part of an iPad group and it's been really fun. I have learned how to edit pictures and videos. I have enjoyed making an Art Deco comic book.

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GLOW Teams and One Drive are resources available to all students to support their learning and to help with the **Developing the Young Workforce** initiative.

S2 Business, Enterprise and Finance students have been working collaboratively on their Entrepreneur presentations in class and are ready to present to their peers on what they have discovered. The Advanced Higher Business Management class completed a Technology task on e-commerce at home using One Drive and GLOW, experiencing what it is like to work on a project with team members who are not in the same physical location as you.





Using **GLOW Forms** to carry out a survey with our Higher Business Management students on the use of **Quizizz** as a learning resource, the feedback was used to justify the development time spent creating new material, to prepare the class for the Understanding Business Assessment. After the Assessment took place, students were again asked about the use of this new resource and their second round of feedback and comments have allowed the department to further refine and improve the use of Quizizz – and also to

produce evidence for our new You Said, We Did boards.



IMPROVEMENT PLAN 18/19


