As a community, we work to ensure that effective protection procedures are in place wherever there is a risk of a child coming to harm.

All children and young people have the right to be protected from all forms of abuse and neglect.

Child protection is the process of protecting children and young people who have been identified as suffering, or likely to suffer harm as a result of abuse. There are four types of abuse: Physical Sexual Emotional Neglect.

Child abuse and neglect have significant effects on children's emotional and physical health, social development, education and future employment. All schools must have at least one of staff who is responsible for child protection. Our team are named over the page.

All adults in school, including volunteers, must have regular training to ensure that they are aware of the signs of abuse and know what to do about their concerns. They have a duty to report concerns.

The school has a legal duty to talk to other agencies if they think a child may be at risk of harm.

If anyone in school is worried about the welfare of your child this will be discussed with you unless they think that this conversation could put your child at a greater risk of harm.

The school must also share all relevant information if they are concerned about your child. The social worker may consult with other agencies before deciding what should happen next. They will also speak to you about the concern and keep you informed about what is happening. Safeguarding is the action that people take to keep all children safe, f

For example:

- Protect children from harm
- Ensure that they are safe and well looked after
- Take action so that all children are able to grow up in a safe environment
