


St Columba's High School – Curriculum Rationale

We work together as a school community to develop, promote and sustain an aspirational vision for our curriculum. The curriculum has a clear vision and rationale shaped by the shared values of the school and its community. Our curriculum is grounded in our commitment to securing children's rights and wellbeing. It takes account of learners' entitlements and the four capacities and reflects the uniqueness of our setting. There is a strategic overview which we use to ensure a shared understanding of the purpose and design of the curriculum. The structure of the curriculum provides equity of opportunity to maximise the successes and achievements of all our learners. We take very good account of the four contexts for learning and cross-cutting themes such as equality, enterprise, creativity, sustainable development education and international engagement. Our creative and innovative approaches to curriculum design support positive outcomes for learners.



We plan curricular pathways incorporating the Career Education Standards, supporting learners to develop the skills they require for work, to achieve and sustain positive post school destinations. Supported by our Careers Adviser from Skills Development Scotland, we track the career interests of learners, providing career specific information, guidance and opportunities throughout their learner journey. The Senior Phase provides opportunities for Curricular Personal Learning Pathways which could encompass: Vocational Courses, Foundation Apprenticeships and Work Placements.



Curriculum	Pupils experience a dynamic curriculum through the BGE and benefit from enriched experiences across their curriculum and benefit from high quality learning experiences that provide breadth, depth and challenge for all young people. Pupils learning experiences incorporate the eight curricular areas within the Broad General Education. Pupil leadership opportunities are provided through termly meetings with BGE pupil voice representatives and learner conversations with year group heads. Pupils actively participate in class and whole school masses and liturgical events as well as volunteering to help at parent information events, fundraisers and charity events both in school and in the wider community including the BGE learner Council and Rights Respecting Schools Group. There are also opportunities to attend family orientated events such as the, Family Cook School, STEM Parental Engagement event and Family Learning workshops in literacy and numeracy. Opportunities for personal achievement	Pupils have the opportunity to engage in a variety of clubs and extra-curricular activities providing opportunities for wider achievement and development of a range of skills and experiences as well as building confidence, engagement and participation in the wider life of the school, all of which are celebrated regularly through year group assemblies and various social media platforms. Pupils can further develop leadership through participation in or as representatives of all clubs and groups (see appendix C). In addition pupils are able to further develop skills and knowledge in literacy and numeracy through opportunities to become Credit Union representatives who help to provide financial education to their peers. Pupils also have opportunities to participate in social enterprise activities, football and netball teams as well as many other sporting and Health and Wellbeing projects designed to ensure that pupils have a fulfilled experience within their Broad General Education at St Columba's High School. Universal Support	An integrated approach to GIRFEC and supporting pupils ensure the needs of all pupils are being met. All pupils benefit from regular contact with their pupil support teacher and are confident in seeking support. Nurturing approaches are targeted and provide an enriched, nurturing experience for groups of pupils and help to develop confidence, skills and abilities through a variety of nurturing activities including outdoor learning opportunities. Staff monitor and track pupil progress and use this to inform next steps in learning. Parents and carers receive a comprehensive report on their child's learning and have the opportunity to meet teaching and pupil support staff to discuss progress. Pupils in the Broad General Education benefit from Careers events through targeted lessons from Skills Development Scotland Careers Advisers helping them to plan ahead and consider choices for the future. Pupils have the opportunity to meet with the school chaplain through weekly school masses, class visits and class masses and opportunities for reconciliation each term. Some National 4 candidates will also work towards National 5 units in some subjects. S5 can become Sports leaders contributing to various cluster activities in Health & Well Being.</p>	<p>S6 pupils are positive role models for younger pupils. They wear the senior school blazer and tie and ensure the highest standards of uniform. Pupils volunteer to help at parent information events, fundraisers and charity events both in school and across the wider community. There are also opportunities to attend family orientated events such as the annual Senior School Awards ceremony and Graduation. Pupils engage in leadership opportunities through the Senior Skills Development Programme designed to further develop skills for life, learning and work and contribute to the development of themselves as citizens of the future. These opportunities include: senior school office bearers elections, the senior prefect programme and committees such as Graduation, Year Book, Charity and Fundraising, Chaplaincy and Learner Council. S6 pupils act as mentors to younger pupils through the Mentors in Violence Prevention. Many pupils participate in: the Pope Benedict XVI Caritas Award programme, subject ambassador's programme, peer education programme, skills development programme, Language/Literacy/Numeracy/Sports Leadership, volunteer placements in local primary schools and opportunities to lead learning with primary pupils.</p>

a learning environment that recognises and promotes diversity and supports them to understand that it is everyone's responsibility to challenge discrimination;



develop understanding of enterprise, entrepreneurship and self-employment as a career opportunity;



develop CMS as an integral part of their curriculum;



have access to a broad range of pathways through their senior phase including learning opportunities leading to work-related qualifications.
