BENCHMARKS AND ASSESSMENT

In March of 2017 Education Scotland, in agreement with the Bishops Conference of Scotland, published a series of what are called **Benchmarks** that have been developed to provide more clarity on the national standards expected with Religious Education in Roman Catholic Schools (RERC). These are used to make clear what learners need to know and be able to do in order to progress through the levels and therefore form the basis for **Assessment**.

For example, in the sample unit on 'Covenant' referred to in this leaflet there are three Learning Outcomes identified:

RERC 3-02a (Image of God)
RERC 3-03a (Revealed Truth of God)
RERC 3-12a (Word of God)

These are matched to a number of Benchmarks that would be used in putting together an assessment. In doing an assessment for this unit, the pupils would be expected to do the following:

- ♦ Explain why the Old Testament is important for Christians
- Apply learning about literary forms to interpret Biblical texts
- Describe in detail how God speaks to people and how God is revealed in Sacred Scripture.
- Identify and discuss situations of wonder and mystery and describe how these make us aware of God's presence.

The specific form of any instruments of assessment will vary from school to school and from RE Department to RE Department. There may be set assessments at particular stages in the year, such as class tests. However assessment may be done on an ongoing basis and could even involve the production of a piece of artwork, some form of research project, or individual pieces of writing.



WHAT IS THIS IS OUR FAITH?

This Is Our Faith, the syllabus for Catholic Religious Education in Scotland, governs the teaching of Religious Education in Scotland's Catholic schools.


This is the first Religious
Education syllabus to be
originated wholly in Scotland
and designed to meet the needs
of young people in Scotland. It
was published in November
2011 by the Scottish Catholic
Education Service on behalf of
the Catholic Bishops of
Scotland; a Senior Phase
version was published in
October 2015.

This is Our Faith is designed to inform teachers' understanding of the nature of the Catholic school, the purpose of religious education, the role of the teacher, the 'Strands of Faith' under which is organised the 'core learning' in faith which young people are expected to experience through their Broad General Education phase (P1 through to S3) and at the Senior Phase (S4 to S6).

The Holy See's granting of the **Decree of Recognitio** is a rare and momentous achievement and pays testimony to the great efforts of so many people who have contributed their time and knowledge to the development of the new syllabus.

This Is Our Faith will help parents, carers, teachers, catechists and clergy to ensure that young people can:

- Develop their knowledge and understanding of the Catholic Faith;
- Nurture respect for other Christian traditions and world faiths;
- Experience opportunities for spiritual growth;
- Acquire the skills of reflection, discernment and moral decision-making;
- Commit to beliefs, values and actions in a positive response to God's invitation to faith.

This Is Our Faith is structured in such a ways as to allow for eight **Strands of Faith** which are used as the organising principles of the framework of experiences and outcomes for Catholic Religious Education, or RERC.

It is not intended that any one Strand of Faith should be taught discretely, but as a combination of one or more that contribute to build up a bigger picture . . . the Paisley Pattern of Religious Education, as it were.

Each Strand of Faith contains three elements as follows:

WE BELIEVE ...

Provides relevant extracts from the Creed—the core statement of Faith professed by the Catholic community.

WE LEARN FROM THE CHURCH ...

Provides some relevant sources from Scripture and Tradition (Church documents, particularly the Catechism of the Catholic Church)

WE UNDERSTAND . . .

Offers a summary of each Strand, based on the relevant teachings of the Catholic Church
