Summer Fair

This was a great success on Saturday, thanks to everyone who donated baking and bottles and who came and spent money on the day. Thank you to so many of you who sold and bought ducks again this year. We sold 1281 ducks raising a huge amount for PTA funds. The ducks made their way (slowly) down the river and we managed to catch them all before they disappeared under the bridge and headed to Findhorn Bay!

The first duck home, winning £150 was bought by Amanda Fraser (sold by Sean Fraser 2F). Second place, winning £100 was bought by Marlena Wrobel (sold by Victor Stockzowski 2E) and 3rd place winning £50 was bought by Cenedra Robb 6W. The very last duck home won £25 and was bought by Ellie McLeod. Ben Ross won the PINZ voucher by selling an amazing 216 ducks.

The total amount raised on the day is estimated at £1800. This makes a great difference to the resources, theatre groups and trips we can offer the children.

<u>Classes</u>

Due to many changes in housing across Moray, we have enrolled a significant number of new children over the last two weeks. We are only now in a position to notify you of classes for August. These have been organised following Moray Council's policy on the structure of primary Classes take into account the number of reading groups and classes. which children have been in a composite (two different age groups) this year. If a class is made up of two age groups, only 25 children can be placed in that class. Otherwise P4-7 classes can rise to 33. When using reading groups, we have to add up the number of children to keep within these numbers. It is not the case for example, that a P2 child in P2/3 class is a good reader while the P3 is poorer. This is simply a case of making sure that children have the best possible support by making fewer groups in a class. In this way, the teacher can spend more time with each group. As reading is a skill on which so many other areas of the curriculum rely, it is important to take the opportunity to provide all the support we can.

Classes cannot be arranged around friendship groups. Every child has had some time in their new classroom today and has a flier which states their teacher's name, room number and which entry door they will use in August.

The classes are now on their fourth or fifth version due to all the recent enrolments. Mrs Meehan does not tell anyone, including teachers, until she feels there will be no more changes to keep anxiety levels down for all. This year however, there are no guarantees that there will be no changes before the end of term if families keep enrolling in the middle of the school at the same rate as the last few weeks.

Rag Bag

There will be a Rag Bag collection on 26th June next week. If you have any items of clothing, shoes, curtains or material you want to clear out, please send them to school.

Building Work

Since receiving your newsletter from the Council, the order of rooms to be worked on has changed. This has been taken into account when telling children which doors they will use to enter the building next term.

The P1-3 playground which originally was going to be available in parts, will now be sectioned off. P2 and P3 will be able to access their doors from the gate on Sanquhar Road at the huts end of the playground. The Council will send out another newsletter soon.

School Meals

In August the building work will focus on the kitchen and dining hall. This means that there will be no hot meals available until the kitchen is back in use. This could take the whole of the first term. Free cold meals will be available for all P1-3 children. For all those P4-7 children who do not want to bring their own packed lunch, only a cold option will be available. We will let you know when hot meals begin again.

Getting it Right for Every Child

This is referred to as GIRFEC in all Council information. You should have received a leaflet in school bag mail on Monday explaining what the wellbeing indicators are. These are coloured sections of a circle under the headings Safe, Healthy, Active, Nurtured, Achieving, Respected, Responsible and Included. These are shortened to SHANARRI. After the holidays we will begin working on these with the children starting with Healthy and Active.
