John Muir Award

As part of the John Muir Award, the P6 pupils have been learning about the need to conserve our local environment. We would like to take this opportunity to thank a Mum and a former pupil; Mrs Pointon and Luke Creaney. They have accompanied P6 every week to Sanquhar Woods, regardless of the weather. Having this support has been vital in allowing all the lessons to go ahead and the children have gained a great deal from

their experience. As part of their work, P6 carried out a litter audit and are concerned about the amount of litter that they found. They have decided to run a campaign 'Slam Dunk the Junk' to encourage everyone to do their bit. You will be hearing from them soon.

Rights Respecting School Award

You may be aware that we are working towards gaining a Rights Respecting School status awarded by Unicef. All schools in Moray are participating. In school we will be working on and referring to the United Nations Convention of the Rights of the Child. These rights will underpin our current school values and will be used as a point of reference for all decisions made in school. You will hear more about this next session.

<u>Classes</u>

For a variety of reasons we have enrolled a significant number of new children over the last few weeks. Many are at the same stage and this has made a big difference to how it may be possible to organise classes for August. There will be eleven classes instead of the twelve we have this year as there is a small Primary 1 year group. For your information, classes are organised following Moray Council's policy on the structure of primary classes. Classes take into account the number of reading groups and which children have been in a composite (two different age groups) this year. If a class is made up of two age groups, only 25 children can be placed in that class. Otherwise P4-7 classes can rise to 33. When using reading groups, we have to add up the number of children to keep within these numbers. It is not the case for example, that a P3 child in P3/4 class is a good reader while the P4 is poorer. This is simply a case of making sure that children have the best possible support by making fewer groups in a class. In this way, the teacher can spend more time with each group. As reading is a skill on which so many other areas of the curriculum rely, it is important to take the opportunity to provide all the support we can.

Classes cannot be arranged around friendship groups. Every child will have some time in their new classroom before the holidays and will receive a flier which states their teacher's name, room number and which entry door they will use in August. This is based on what we know about the building work at the moment and could of course change

The classes are now on their fourth or fifth version due to all the recent enrolments. Mrs Meehan does not tell anyone, including teachers, until she feels there will be no more changes to keep anxiety levels down for all. This year however, there are no guarantees that there will be no changes before the end of term if families keep enrolling at the older end of the school at the same rate as the last few weeks.

Building Work

The Council will send out another newsletter soon to give you an update of where the development is now. Please note that due to the building work, we are <u>unable</u> to open during the holidays for uniform to be collected
