# Internet Safety Our Responsibilities

This leaflet gives some ways for parents, pupils and the school to help each other keep children safe online.

### To support children to stay safe online parents should:

- explore and understand the apps, games and sites your child uses and get to know your child's online world better
- talk to your child about their online world, just as you would ask about their school day and make sure you know which sites and apps they are using
- discuss and agree family rules and boundaries for staying safe online.
   Make sure you are a good role model
- manage your child's online safety by using the parental control settings available
- respond quickly to concerns raised by your child and don't be afraid to ask the school for help and advice

- reinforce the message that what's right and wrong off line (being kind to others, only talking to people you know and not to strangers etc) is also true online
- tell the school promptly if you have any concern about the online safety of children

### To keep children safe online at school, we:

- have filters and monitoring systems in place so no pupil can access harmful content via the school
- give pupils advice on how they can safeguard themselves online
- respond quickly to any concerns raised by pupils about inappropriate content or contact, such as cyber bullying
- provide information sessions for parents about what we are doing at school
- attend regular training courses and keep up to date with best practice online safety advice
- involve parents and children in regular discussions about internet safety

- tell parents promptly if we have any concerns about their child's online safety
- listen carefully to children to make sure we pick up on any issues that worry them

### To help themselves stay safe, children can:

- follow guidance set by your parents and the school for online well being
- only play online with people you know in the real world and beware of stranger danger
- talk and behave kindly to others online as you would in real life
- talk to a grown up if you see something that worries you
- tell a grown up you trust immediately if someone tries to contact you online
- never share personal information that could put you in danger (like where you live or your real name)
- think very carefully about who might see pictures you post online (now or in the future). Remember you can't take them off again later
