Drawing club- an adventure into Story

In my last newsletter I mentioned 'Drawing Club' as an inspiring initiative Mrs Chalmers was keen to develop here at Botriphnie. P1 and 2 have been taking part in Drawing Club. This involves sharing stories and animations with children whilst at the same time enriching their language skills, developing their fine motor and spending 'Time Together' with them. Drawing Club brings the world of story to life. It develops creativity and imagination and develops the use of new vocabulary.

This is very much up and running and we have all been delighted with the results thus far, particularly their use of new vocabulary. Look out for some Drawing Club sheets coming home for your child to share with you. Here is what some of the pupils had to say about it... "Drawing Club is amazing. We listen to a story and then draw different aspects like characters, settings, problems and ideas to extend the story."

"We test each other every day on the new wow vocabulary words. They are words like **destroy**, **astonish**, **ignore**, **sliver**. We try and use the new words in our writing."

Earthtime sessions were well received by all and provided a motivating context, not only for our new P1s to get to know everyone but also for our whole school community to transition. We were very impressed with how our older pupils are emerging as leaders. Mrs Chalmers is keen to develop this further, with a continued weekly forest school session.
