#### Innovative Curriculum Design

Here at Botriphnie we pride ourselves in facilitating relevant and motivating learning experiences. Our curriculum offer is continually evolving and refreshed with learner agency at the heart of our approach. Here's a flavour of how learning voice has shaped recent individual learner pathways.

#### **Opportunities for Personal Achievement- Confident Individuals**

Charlie demonstrated a real 'Have a Go Jo' mindset as he set of with P6/7 at Newmill for a day of Adventurous Activity. Charlie asked for more opportunities to socialise with peers and develop outdoor learning skills. Here's what he had to say...

"On the last day of term I went to Portknockie with P6/7 at Newmill. We got the choice to go kayaking or paddleboarding. I



chose kayaking. First we played a game with our oars. When the instructor 'left' you had to move left and grab the oar before it fell. Sometimes she would say 360...which meant you had to make a complete turn and pick up your oar before it fell. After that we played another game on the kayaks called 'World Domination'. It's basically where you pick a country and go round tapping your oars on the back of other kayaks three times to get them to join your country. After lunch, we jumped in and went into some caves. We had to crawl by the end as the caves were so narrow. Whenever the waves came in, they would splash against the roof and walls of the cave. It looked really cool. Overall, it was a really fun day even though the weather wasn't great. I could hardly feel my toes by the end of the day. I would definitely go if there was an opportunity to do this again"

#### **Opportunities for Personal Achievement- Swimming Skills**

After a KGS transition event which involved a swimming session, Taylah decided she would like to develop her stroke and overall water confidence. As a result, we are heading to the pool on a weekly basis for swimming lessons, with the target of being able to swim a length, on her front independently. She feels this will support her to feel more confidently able to approach swimming sessions at KGS. As a school, we talked about how we could involve the whole school and I've arranged a Botriphnie Primary School fun session on the last Wednesday of term between 10-11 am. In order to take the whole school, I'd need some parental volunteers in order to meet the adult child ratio for under eights. It would provide a great opportunity for Taylah to showcase her progress and celebrate her last week at Botriphnie Primary School. I am very proud of Taylah's 'Resilient Ruby' Mindset....target setting and working hard to achieve goals...it's what successful learners do...well done!

Taylah has a number of transition activities to look forward to this session. She will be heading to Newmill to meet both English and Maths teachers with her P7 peers, as well as, heading to KGS next Friday for a School Tour with 'The Loft'....exciting times.
