An Emotional Journey Back in Time

S6 pupil Tegan Gregory has just returned from a once in a lifetime trip where she represented the UK on the 2017 Vimy Pilgrimage Award. Tegan's interest in WW1 was initially sparked when she studied the novel 'All Quiet On The Western Front' for her N5 English. "I found this book amazing and it left me wanting to find out more about this dreadful war". So when the exciting opportunity to visit several historical attractions in Belgium and France came about she was extremely enthusiastic to take part. This enthusiasm carried Tegan all the way to success through the tough application and selection process in which she had to prove her contribution to the community in order to gain a place on this trip. Volunteering in after school clubs as well as her participation in the S6 leadership programme made Tegan a prime candidate, allowing her to become one of two people representing the whole of the UK.



During her trip, she visited several memorials, laid a wreath at the Ypres first post ceremony and attended the Vimy 100 ceremony which was also attended by Prince William, Prince Harry and Canadian Prime Minister Justin Trudeau. Her group were also given access to private areas by the Durand group. Tegan described the trip as a: "once in a lifetime experience", saying she was, "grateful to have been chosen". The trip also allowed for international friendship, with Tegan forming several relationships with Canadian and French students. She said: "I have met some amazing people and made some great friends! I also feel my interest in history has been fully encouraged and furthered through this fantastic experience". The trip was opened up to European students for this year due to the 100th anniversary of the Vimy Ridge battle. However, there is possibility for European involvement in the future and Tegan's fantastic experience should encourage any budding historian to look into this opportunity.
