As we enter Spring, it can be helpful to some bereaved families, to leave behind the cold dark days and be in a lighter environment. We know that doesn't change the impact of grief, but sometimes it feels just a little less heavy, when we see the days become longer.

We have just passed Mother's Day, which is one of the annual days that can bring added sadness to those children whose mother is no longer here. Remembering mum can bring with it bitter-sweet memories, and for many children, they come to the realisation that their mum is no longer here.

We at ACBS, support many children who have a loved one that has died, and for many children we support that will be their dad. Many mums find our support through the networks they have built, but father's of children whose mother has died are less likely to know about, and use our service. If you know of a dad who is in this position, then please let them know that we are here for them also, this can be during palliative care or at any stage of the bereavement process.

As you read through this newsletter, you will see that we continue our plight to increase our number of volunteers and to reach out to build our services in Highlands and Tayside. If you are aware of anyone who may be interested in joining us, we would be delighted to speak to them. We do have an application process and full training and support are provided. The more volunteers we have, the more bereaved children and young people we can reach.

I would like to give my thanks to our current volunteers and ACBS team who always go that extra mile. I look forward to meeting families who come together at our activity days. It is always heart-warming to see children who arrive shy, build their confidence and leave with a big smiles. So please look out for our future activity days. You will always be provided with a warm welcome, as well as a cuppa and a chat.

### Updates from our Bereavement Coordinators

#### ACBS Highlands

As I'm sure you are aware, our Home Responder Visit service is one of our main sources of supporting bereaved children and families at ACBS. Whilst we are still quite new in the Highland region, we have not been able to offer this service as yet, but we have some fantastic news!

We now have one fully trained volunteer who will be able to support a number of our referrals. This is really exciting for us as we know how valuable our Responder service is to bereaved families as many have experienced in Grampian. We would like to give a warm welcome to our new volunteer, Hester and wish her well as she makes a huge difference and contribution to how our services will run here in the Highlands.

We also seeing a number of schools use our mentoring service, where one of our committee members provides support, guidance and practical advice on how they can support individual bereaved children in their school. This has been amazing, to build confidence in professionals to be able to have conversations with children that could otherwise be too uncomfortable or sensitive. We are grateful that we can make this impact in schools locally. This part of our service is suitable for any practitioner or professional working with children and young people who are bereaved - be sure to get in touch if you would like to obtain more information about this service.

ACBS has kindly been donated a variety of days out that will be used for the families we support. Just to mention a couple, the Aviemore Reindeer Centre and Strathspey Stream Railway, their gifts provide a great opportunity for families to take some time out to spend together away from the hustle and bustle of family life as well as a bereavement.
