strategies to get the ball from one end of the hall to the other. We all want to go back again and try next week. "P4/5 reflection



Staff Training-School Improvement

It was a real bucket filler when these two arrived, on behalf of their class, to a share a proud moment this week. As part of our In-service, all teachers were able to participate in some fantastic professional learning, all the way from Australia. The title was 'Explicitly Teaching Writing' and we were all desperate to try out some of the things we learned with pupils. Great to see it is already having an impact! With more training ahead, this will form part of our school improvement journey next session.

"We were creating an explanation text using the context of the digestive system. Mrs Wright tried something different this week. We used a new describing bubble template to help us plan what we were going to write. We used the bubble planning sheet to think through all our ideas and then created paragraphs from

our notes. I found this much easier. I felt like I knew exactly what to write and didn't repeat facts. It was a good feeling." Brogan, P7
