It was a real bucket filler to welcome parents in to meet with teachers to discuss individual learner progress and achievements just before the holidays. This time, we provided written reports in advance as a result of parental feedback via our questionnaires; with the aim of providing parents the opportunity to ask questions around aspects of the report to gain a full and accurate picture of their attainment and achievement to date. We always have such a great turnout which supports partnership working to ensure all our learners reach their full potential as they continue to climb the tower of learning. Thank you for



your support. Teachers tell me that parents have a much better understanding of the numeracy and maths data provided and how we are using assessments to measure progress and plan next steps. This is something we will be exploring further as an ASG at Keith Primary on Friday 12<sup>th</sup> May with a numeracy themed 'moderation' event where we aim to continue to develop our ASG approach to raising attainment via a focus on learning, teaching and assessment.

Mrs Watt and Mrs Murdoch have been climbing the tower of learning. They will both be attending a 'Play Pedagogy and Early literacy' event in Elgin, as part of our professional development activities planned for the In Service days. The aim being to gain a stronger understanding of how to:

- Enrich the implementation of play pedagogy in your class
- Provide practical tools to support the implementation of play pedagogy
- Explore ways to improve literacy outcomes for young children

Mrs Wright, Mrs Mair and I continue to focus on raising attainment in literacy. We will use the day to work through our school improvement action plan with a focus on further developing our spelling and grammar programme.


work...what an amazing achievement ...well done to all and thank you once again to parents for supporting this initiative via funding.
