Reporting

Reflection jotters are the main vehicle for continuous reporting, providing an opportunity for regular information and feedback around learning experiences and progress. We are delighted to see so many parents signing and commenting on a weekly basis-they provide a fantastic tool for home school communication, supporting all learners. We continue to embed our Newmill Ninja Mindset, so please celebrate when children mention that they have found something challenging and need more practice - this is clear evidence they are learning.
