

It's been a busy month for our Reading Leaders, with so many events to coordinate.

We would like to say a huge thank you to everyone who took part in our 'Spooky Story Hunt' around the village. We were delighted with the number of entries. The children enjoyed 'marking' their entries and deciding on the winners. Thank you to Ashley Inglis who helped present prizes. We wanted to thank our kind community neighbours for their support and recognised their commitment with an 'Over and Above' certificate for their commitment to our school value 'Support'.



During Book Week Scotland, P3456 used this year's theme 'HOPE' to inspire them during poetry writing. Firstly, they used the poem 'Me' by Shapna Haddow from 'The Book of Hopes' to create a free verse poem all about the things they like about themselves. The pupils were very creative and used Mrs Wright's poem as a WAGOLL (what a good one looks like) to support their writing.

Additionally, P3456 wrote narrative poems about 'hope', using Pie Corbett's 'Story Time' poem as a stimulus. As our topic was 'hope', pupils had to use personification and give hope human qualities before creating their poems. The results were fantastic and some of our pupils shared their poems at assembly. I have shared some examples of the poems created within this newsletter. It is fair to say my bucket was



overflowing with the quality. I noticed Lyla managed to
