Life and Work of the School as a Community- Reading Schools

Things have been pretty hectic on the Reading Schools front. All our learners have been able to engage with authors and illustrate through attending 'Authors Live' Events across the school. We had an extremely successful joint school reading morning exploring the theme of 'Empathy'. It is always a real bucket filler for me to see the mix of blue and green jumpers together with Botriphnie joining us for the morning. Here's what some of our pupils had to say...

"Today Botriphnie and Newmill did 'Empathy' day. First we got split up into groups. Next we went to Mrs Watt to read 'The Suitcase'. After that we went to Miss Smith. We read 'Between Tick and Tock'. I played football with the boys. After snack we went to Mrs Mair to read 'Odd Dog Out'. We read these books because it was empathy day. My favourite book was the suitcase. I felt happy. It was awesome. Empathy is like when you feel someone's feelings. I felt like a Curious Carly."



"Today, Botriphnie came for World Empathy Day. We listened to 4 books relating to empathy. The four books that we listened to were: Odd Dog Out, Between Tick and Tock, The Suitcase and Lubna and Pebble. My favourite book was Odd Dog Out. We had to do tasks after we listened to the book. The task for 'The Suitcase' was to pick a country we wanted to visit. I picked Japan.

My favourite part was seeing everyone and listening to the books. I already knew about empathy but I think celebrating it helped me know a bit more."

"The author of 'Tick Tock' used great literacy devices. There were short sentences, onomatopia, alliteration, rhyming and repetition of words."

After our event, I headed to Ordiquhill Primary School to deliver a professional development session for staff, sharing information about Reading Schools and how the focus has

supported our literacy attainment journey.

Working with other schools and leading professional development sessions are part of the mandatory actions within the action plan.

Learners are thoroughly enjoying their class novel. Teachers have been working on written reports



this term and I've really enjoyed reading them. Our older pupils have included their own comments, sharing their perspective on how they are progressing and what helps them learn. Analysis of pupil comments, tell me class novels are definitely a motivator, supporting progress in reading.

"On Monday, we read our new novel 'The Letter with the Golden Stamp' We have figured out a girl called Audrey is in a police station for a reason we don't know. She's only nine and looks after her brother, sister and mum. She figures out there is a spy who lives across the road from her. I am really hooked and I am enjoying this book already."
