When will my child start?



Every child in North Ayrshire is entitled to 1140 hours provision per year and they are entitled to start in August, Jan or April whichever is the term after their 3rd Birthday.

Starting dates and times can vary according to each child's attendance pattern. We want your child to form a really secure attachment with their keyworker.

Please remember all children are different, some children settle quickly while others take longer.

Your child will be assigned to a specific group, under the care of a Keyworker. They will be responsible for your child's special book which will document their unique learning path through the early level curriculum. Pupils will have ownership of this book and they will be stored in the playroom at children's height.

The team will have professional development on a weekly basis and this will include a Professional Reading Group and a Distributed Leadership Role to upskill everyone and ensure a high quality approach.

There will be weekly updates through Seesaw/Twitter for each group and monthly celebration of learning for parents to attend. There will be a variety of students and they will never be given sole responsibility for your child.

We will also have Professional visitors such as Jenny Fraser – Early Years Specialist, Amy McKinnon – Teacher of the Deaf, SPIN Team (Speech & Language) and Health Visitors to discuss the wellbeing and development of your child. 

"I have confidence in the people who support and care for me' (Care Standards 2019) Your child will need a pair of indoor shoes to change into when they arrive in Nursery and we will provide a pair of Wellington boots and an outdoor suit to be used in our outside area every day.



What will my child need to wear?

Your child will spend their time in nursery playing, learning and exploring our outdoor areas as they will be outside every day. The children will get messy so please ensure that your child is wearing play clothes and not their best clothes. To encourage independence clothes which are easily managed at the toilet are best.

What will my child eat?

As part of 1140 hours, North Ayrshire will provide your child with a healthy snack, lunch and a light tea during each session. The children are encouraged to be independent and serve themselves. Please inform staff if your child has a particular food allergy or dietary requirement. In line with Care Inspectorate 'Setting the Table' Nutritional guidance and food standards for early year's childcare providers in Scotland.

What should I do when I arrive at nursery?

A member of staff will be at the door to greet our parents/carers every day. To encourage independence, they will support your child in the cloakroom area, support them to hang their coat on the named peg, change their shoes and put outdoor shoes away. A member of staff will sign the child in and direct them inside to the playroom.



What happens when I collect my child?

Your child can be collected from the Nursery door at the end of each session. Parents are asked to ring the door and wait until greeted by a member of staff. A member of staff will mark the register as you leave. If someone different is collecting your child **it is essential that you inform us**. This can be done in person or by phone. Tell us the name and relationship of the person who will collect your child and the date /time so that this information can be written in our diary. Please also remind a member of staff at the start of a session if possible. In the interests of safety, your child will not be allowed to leave with someone different unless the nursery staff have been informed. **The nursery staff will not allow a child to leave with any person under the age of 16**

What happens if my child is ill?

If your child is sick, please telephone 01294 552251-Ext 3 and speak to a member of staff. Please do not message on See Saw as messages can sometimes be missed and it's a requirement that we have to speak to someone verbally on the phone.

If your child has had sickness and/or diarrhoea they should have **two full days – 48 hours clear of infection** before they return to nursery.

If your child has an infection such as measles, chicken pox or conjunctivitis etc. please inform the nursery and follow the guidance in your enrolment pack. Your child should be **free of the infection** before they return to nursery

What happens if my child becomes ill at nursery? If staff are concerned about your child's health during a session, a member of staff will contact you first and then the person designated by you as an emergency contact. The emergency contact(s) are listed on your child's enrolment form. What happens if my child has an accident? If your child has an accident they will be treated by a member of staff. If the incident is of a serious nature it will be entered in our incident log which you will be shown and asked to sign. We will contact you immediately if your child has a serious accident or a bump to the head.



What is Getting it Right for Every Child all about? Getting It Right For Every Child also known as GIRFEC is the national approach in Scotland 'supporting families to improve outcomes and support the wellbeing of our children by offering the right help at the right time from the right people'. The aim is to help them to grow up feeling loved, safe and respected so that they can realise their full potential.
To ensure everyone has a common understanding of what wellbeing means, the Scottish Government has described wellbeing in terms of eight indicators, which are Safe, Healthy, Achieving, Nurtured, Active, Respected, Responsible and Included. These



are sometimes abbreviated to the acronym known as SHANARRI.

What is U.N.C.R.C? UNCRC is The United Nations of the Convention on the Child It is the most widely ratified human rights treaty in history and acknowledgement of the importance of children's rights. The UNCRC embodies the idea that every child should be recognised, respected and protected as a rights holder and as a unique and valuable human being. It applies to all persons under the age of 18. Since the adoption of the UNCRC, children's lives have been transformed in many areas. The UNCRC supports children in such activities by attributing them a wide range of rights and freedoms.

What does my child do all day in nursery?

Our nursery philosophy is underpinned by the National Improvement Framework, Realising the Ambition and new Care Standards and Quality Framework from Care Inspectorate. Our aim is to give pupils meaningful opportunities to participate and take ownership of their learning.

Realising the Ambition provides opportunities to upskill staff on key characteristics of child development based on research and evidence. It explores the range of interactions, experiences and spaces we need to provide for our children to help them learn and grow best.

Our Starting point will be your child and what they are interested in. Within a typical day we will consult with your child in a floor book and they will be involved in learning experiences which will promote their development and learning.

We will always be on a continuous cycle of improvement through self-evaluation and strive to increase expectations of high quality.

How can I get involved with Family Engagement?



Our aim will always be to work in partnership with you our Abbey family as you are your child's first and foremost teacher. The impact of working with your family should always show a significant improvement in your child's learning and achievement and reduce potential barriers to engagement and overcome disadvantages.

We will work in partnership with others in the local community to support families to secure better outcomes through programmes which enable them to improve literacy, numeracy and health and wellbeing. Our setting very much values the contribution parents/carers and families make to children's learning. We will establish positive relationships to support confidence and self-esteem within families.

How will my child's progress be recorded?

Nursery staff will collect data on your child's progress throughout the year by means of their Personal Learning Plan, Learner's Journey and a carefully structured responsive learning programme to support learning and development. There will be information on your child's progress which will be documented in the form of a report at the end of the session. We will provide opportunities for parents and families to engage in their child's learning and to have information on how best to support this at home. Our approach to reporting will allow staff to provide a clear and individualized picture of each child as a learner at key points throughout the year and use a range of current, planned assessment information when reporting to parents and families.



Will I be able to discuss my child's progress?

Yes, you will be invited to attend informative workshops throughout the year and monthly celebrations of learning. Parental Consultation will also be organised for later in the session where you will be able to discuss your child's progress with their keyworker. You will be informed of this through Seesaw, Twitter and in the newsletter, when you will be given an opportunity to make a dedicated appointment with your child's keyworker. If you have any concerns or questions, please do not hesitate to speak to us. You will be provided with a monthly newsletter giving details of events, holidays and all learning taking place. All keyworkers will upload responsive planning via Seesaw and Twitter every week. Our Family Notice Board will be at the front door and it will also contain local community information.
