### Supporting Your Child With Reading

- Sound out and blend the letters
- Use the pictures for clues
- Look for smaller words hidden inside bigger words
- Read on, see if you can make sense of the word
- Look to see if the word is similar to one you already know
- Cut the word up into syllables

### Questions you can ask your child....

- Who is the main character?
- Where is the story set?
- What do you think will happen next?
- Which character do you like most? Why?
- What is your favourite part of the story?
- Did you like the ending? Why?
