

<p>Rhyming Words I Spy</p> <p>Think of something you can see and tell the person you are playing with:</p> <p>"I Spy something that rhymes with..."</p> <p>Your clue doesn't have to be a real word but it does have to rhyme with your answer.</p>	<p>Two the Same</p> <p>Write out a set of tricky words on card or paper. You need two sets to play. Turn all the cards over and take turns to find a pair of matching words.</p> <p>Phase 2 words: to, no, go, I, into, the</p> <p>Phase 3 words: he, she, we, me, be, was, you, they, all, are, my, her</p>	<p>Kim's Game</p> <p>Write out 6 letters of the alphabet on cards. Concentrate on the cards before someone takes one away. Can you remember which letter is missing? Try it with more letters or tricky words.</p>	<p>Alliteration Station</p> <p>Think of an animal starting with 'a' for example ant. Use a describing word for ant that starts with the same sound e.g. amazing ant. Play a game to see how many animals you can describe;</p> <p>"I went to the zoo and I saw ...</p> <p>An amazing ant</p> <p>The biggest buffalo</p> <p>A crazy crocodile etc</p>
<p>Character Building</p> <p>Draw a picture or choose one from a book or magazine showing an interesting character. It could be a pirate for example. Think of all the words you can to describe that character and ask an adult to write them around the picture in cloud bubbles. Is your character tall, short, thin, fat, ugly, handsome? Is your character happy, sad, angry, naughty, fearless? How many words did you manage to find to describe your character?</p>	<p>Label Everything!</p> <p>Ask your adult if you would be allowed to label your toy boxes. Write nice labels for them and include a picture. Using a different coloured pen each time, draw an outline around your name, keeping close to each letter. Keep drawing around the outline until you eventually reach the edges of the paper.</p>	<p>Cartoon Capers</p> <p>Fold a strip of paper in half and then in half again. Unfold it to form a strip of boxes. Draw a character or even a stick man in the first box. Think of something funny that could happen to your character and draw a different part of the story in each box. Add speech marks and write what he or she is saying.</p>	
<p>Other Curricular Area Challenges</p>	<p>Obstacle Course</p> <p>Make up an obstacle course in the garden or an outdoor space. Write instructions on pieces of paper or card that would be useful. For example, "Take 3 steps forward" or "Climb up" or "Step on something red". Share out the cards to your adult and see who can cross the obstacle course first.</p>	<p>Garden Treasure Map</p> <p>Make a treasure map based on your own garden or familiar walk. Draw on all the things that you walk past like the shed, a bench etc. Hide a piece of 'treasure' and draw footsteps or a dotted line to show the way to the treasure. Play the game with an adult.</p>
