Is it important to learn about history?

Studying History helps us understand change and how the society we live in came to be.

You know that what happens in the world today will impact what it is like in the future. (Think about how much we care about climate change and what we are now trying to do to prevent it.)


Is it important to learn about history?



Looking back at History allows us to understand why the world we live in today is like the way that it is.

Therefore learning about the past helps us understand where we have come from and better inform us about what the world might be like in the future.


Activity 2: Life in Scotland today

4. Overall, do you think this period in time is a good period of time to grow up compared to other periods? Give reasons for your answers (don't just think about the last few months)








