

Peter and the Waterwolf




Peter lived many years ago in a strange place where the land was lower than the sea. It was called the Netherlands.

Peter and his father were climbing onto the top of a dyke as they talked. At the top, they stood and looked at the sea moving on the other side.


"It does seem almost alive," said Peter.
