Do you think your child should be given homework?	83%	17%	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Once a week is ok - Yes...so that any learning can be reinforced within the home setting - Yes, I do believe my child should have a small amount of homework, in order to prepare them for the amount they get in high school - Yes, let's the parents see progress in their child's school work and what they are currently doing in class - No, I think they have enough academia throughout the school day - Yes if it helps them progress. No if it's just for ticking boxes - Yes, to build parental involvement - I think one piece a week for the older children is fine. Anything more becomes more work for parents - Yes, especially reading and sharing books at home - Yes, essential skill once they reach secondary, so building habit in primary encourages independence later on - Yes. It teaches children that they have a responsibility for their own learning - I think it should be optional. As a parent with health conditions I don't make it a priority as I am overwhelmed most days - Yes I do. Reason for this is I feel it encourages them to learn more not only in school but at home too. It gets them into a good routine with homework and it prepares them for high school - Yes, gives us as parents a chance to assist them with it - Yes. It helps me to see how my child is doing with different subject and allows me to be part of their learning - A little. Even as a P1 mum I like to know what parts of the curriculum are being covered so that I can consolidate (when able to) at home. Even if we are not able to cover the specific activities we can talk about the topics - I'm happy with reading books being sent home. I take my children's lead with homework. If they show an interest in the work then we set aside time. I will prioritise rest and play over homework

Now my child has no homework and is in P6 he thrives he doesn't have it because it's always been an issue to get him to do it. However, if homework was a list and the child picked what they like to do would be an idea. However the parent/carer would need to police to ensure they don't always do what would suits them • 10/15 mins a day • 30 min • Only 10 minutes to reduce stress/pressure • 2 hours • Whatever they can manage • As my son is only in P1 I would advise 10- 15 mins per day

Nothing on a device! - Practising skills learned at school - Fun tasks on seesaw work well. Research, project based work too - Whatever the class teacher deems fit, but always academic learning - Interesting tasks that are fun, which include all areas of learning. My child does not like homework and finds the home is not for sitting down once he's home to do homework activities like creating, reaching facts and doing a presentation etc I would recommend - Reading book, worksheets - Good to see a range. Reading should be standard - Creative task, problem solving - Everything that they are doing in school to solidify learning - I find informal homework more beneficial.
